#### 18 Residential Street Projects Set for 2024

S treets throughout town will be improved this year, Mayor Tom Perciak said in his State of the City address.

### Innovation has Kept Strongsville Thriving: Mayor

S trongsville has thrived over the last two decades because of the city's focus on innovation, Mayor Tom Perciak said during his 2024 State of the City address March 12.

The mayor told a packed house at the Strongsville Recreation Center that the city has embraced change, from new ways to finance projects to new technology in the police and fire departments, to stay a step ahead.

"The key to Strongsville's continued success is innovation," Perciak said.

The safety forces are also on the cutting edge, with plans



to construct a state-of-theart fire station near the center of town to better serve residents in that area.

And the police department is leaps and bounds ahead of other area communities in some areas of technology, including its use of drones to search for missing people or fleeing suspects or to investigate incidents like traffic accidents. New 3D software allows the six qualified drone operators in the department to reconstruct the accident

scene in realistic fashion.

The department is also installing Flock cameras at 19 strategic locations around town to get a better handle on criminals' movements.

#### Look for Foxes and their Kits in the Early Spring

If you've seen a fox in your yard lately, that's because it's denning season, according to Animal Control Officer Chuck McCleary.

Between the end of March and early April, a mother fox will give birth to four of five kits. To keep them safe from coyotes, she will often choose a den site close to people, away from where coyotes generally go -- like under a porch, shed, garage, barn, or side of a hill.

McCleary asks that you offer them a short-term rental in your yard. "If you are lucky enough to see how beautiful an adult fox is, or witness the kits playing (at a distance, of



course), you will be glad you did!" he said.

Mama fox wont harm your kids or pets.

#### **Council Corner: Making Sure Seniors are Safe**

Senior Citizens who live on their own are the focus of the city's Welfare Caller program.

The program is designed to check in with seniors every day to make sure they're doing all right, and send help if there's a problem.



Those who sign up for the pro-

gram will receive an automated call every morning. If they answer the phone, the system will note they are fine.

If there's no answer, the system will try again in a few minutes, in case the resident didn't hear the phone. If there's still no answer, the system will call or text the person's emergency contact, who can then either check on the senior personally or ask the police department to do so.

## Drop off Household Hazardous Waste April 30 - May 1

The first of two 2023 Household Hazardous Waste Collections is set for April 30 — May 1 at the Service Center, 16099 Foltz Pkwy.

Residents can drop off their household products 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. either of the two days.

Materials accepted include oil or solvent-based paint (no latex paint), varnish, mineral spirits, caustic household cleaners, adhesives, gasoline, sealers, polyurethane, herbicides, automotive fluids, roof tar, lighter fluid, primers and coatings, shellac, pesticides, motor oil, driveway sealer, mercury, paint thinner, turpentine, fungicides, car batteries, and kerosene.

To dispose of latex paint, leave the lid off to dry up the paint, or mix in a drying agent, then place it out with your regular trash.

LATEX PAINT IS NOT ACCEPTED.
