Roundabout a Possibility at Shurmer-Howe

City officials are taking a look at the idea of building a three-way roundabout at the corner of Howe and Shurmer roads to improve safety and clear up traffic jams.



Strongsville will seek bids for a firm to study the idea.

The single-lane roundabout would act to slow traffic on Howe, but keep it moving through the intersection. It would eliminate left turns onto Howe from Shurmer. Instead, motorists would merge right (south) onto Howe and follow the circle counter-clockwise to head north.

City Engineer Ken Mikula said the design would keep motorists from idling on Shurmer and would keep traffic on Howe moving. The city has also looked at widening Howe, adding a left-turn lane on Shurmer and upgrading the traffic signal — a project estimated to be more expensive than a roundabout.
