Planting is Under Way in New Community Garden

The city, in partnership with Southwest General, has created a community garden so residents who don't have space to grow vegetables and fruits will now have the chance.

Southwest is providing the land for the garden next to its medical center at Pearl and Drake roads.

The garden includes 64 8-by-4-foot raised beds available for \$25 per summer on a first come, first served basis.

Jennifer Milbrandt, the city's coordinator of natural resources, said she and local volunteers have been working for four years to establish

a community garden in Strongsville.

"We're happy to see it finally come to fruition, " Milbrandt said.

A groundbreaking ceremony was held May 24 with Mayor Tom Perciak and William Young, president and CEO of Southwest. Plots were made available to rent on May 19.

The garden will be organic, with no pesticides allowed. Milbrandt will monitor the garden to make sure gardeners keep their plots tended.

Each gardener is asked to plant one row of vegetables to be donated to the Strongsville Food Bank.
