Be Wary of Door-to-Door Contractors, Police Warn

Residents are asked to be wary of contractors going door-to-door selling services like tree-trimming, roofing and driveway repair.

While some are reputable, others are not.

Police said residents should first make sure the person at their door has a valid Strongsville solicitor's permit. If not, close the door and call police at (440) 238-7373.

Next, check references before you hire someone. Ask the contractor for references, and also make sure they're in good standing with the Better Business Bureau and registered with the city Building Department.



Third, don't give them money upfront, with a promise they'll return to do the job.

ALSO: NEVER walk outside with a door-to-door solicitor to check out an alleged problem with your roof, a tree or other issue.

Sometimes that person is trying to occupy your atten-

tion while an unseen accomplice waits nearby to slip into your house, stealing whatever he can grab while you're distracted.

That hasn't been reported in Strongsville so far this spring, but it's happened throughout northeast Ohio in the past.

New Playground to be Built at Surrarrer Park

amilies living in the north end of town will have another playground option this summer when the city installs swings and other equipment at Surrarrer Park.

Recreation Director Bryan Bogre said the playground will include equipment accessible to kids in wheelchairs.



The city has set aside \$100,000 in recreation funds that previously paid for residents' ice time at OBM Arena. Strongsville's contract with the ice rink expired last year.

Bogre said the city will also seek a state grant that could pay up to 75 percent of the playground cost.

Surrarrer Park, at the corner of Webster and Whitney, now has tennis and basketball courts, a ballfield, pavilion and swing set.

Acceptable items include: (small paper clips and staples can still be attached) accounting ledger paper, adding machine tape, advertisements, booklets/ brochures, copy machine paper, colored paper - 20 pound, computer paper, envelopes, faxes, manila file folders, greeting cards, laser printer paper, legal pad paper, Post-it notes, NCR paper, receipts and all types of white paper.

NOT ACCEPTED: Newspapers, phone books, maga-

zines, binders, books, pendaflex folders, food and candy wrappers, waxed paper, photographs, napkins and Styrofoam containers.

Businesses on the Move

Wine Down & Sweets Café has opened at 14785 Pearl Rd. It features baked goods and wine.

Giant Eagle is seeking to rezone land at the corner of Webster and Royalton roads to build a **GetGo** gas station. The company wants to rezone 3.23 acres that previously housed an auto repair shop to motorist services for the gas station, and most of the rest of the 31.5acre parcel to public facilities. The plan is to donate much of the larger parcel to Cleveland Metroparks. Because the bulk of the land is currently residential, voters would have to approve the rezoning.

Gill's Beverage and Deli has received Planning Commission approval to build a new store at 11654 Pearl Road. It will move there from its current location on Prospect Road.
