Residents: Beware the 'Distraction' Burglary

Police urge residents to be aware of a type of burglary that happens while you're at home — often while you're in the next room or just outside the door.

In a distraction burglary, someone typically comes to your door claiming to be a contractor or offering to



perform a service at your home. The visitor tries to lure you outside to look at an alleged problem, or asks to come inside. Meanwhile, an accomplice is slipping unnoticed into another part of your house and grabbing valuables.

In one case this spring, a young woman came to a resident's home and, claiming she was moving in next door, asked to see the view of her new back yard from the resident's window.

Police say you should always make sure someone at your door has a solicitor's permit issued by the city of Strongsville, and should be wary if a stranger engages you in conversation while you're working in the yard.

Bring Your Documents to be Shredded June 22

The city will host its annual Shred Day on Saturday, June 22. Residents can bring their documents to the Service Center, 16099 Foltz Parkway, between 9 a.m. and noon to have them safely destroyed free of charge.

Acceptable items include: (small paper clips and staples can still be attached) accounting ledger paper, adding machine tape, advertisements, booklets/ brochures, copy machine paper, colored paper - 20 pound, computer paper, envelopes, faxes, manila file folders, greeting cards, laser printer paper, legal pad paper, Post-it notes, NCR paper, receipts and all types of white paper.

NOT ACCEPTED: Newspapers, phone books, maga-

zines, binders, books, pendaflex folders, food and candy wrappers, waxed paper, photographs, napkins and Styrofoam containers.
