City Creates Safe Zones for Bees, Insects

S igns are going up around town marking Pollinator Habitats – places the city is creating where bees and butterflies can thrive.

The areas will be around the perimeters of the parks, adjacent to woods, where they won't impact players on the fields.

Pollinators are crucial to the world's food supply and natural ecosystems.

A riparian corridor will also be established along the stream that runs through the Drake Road Rec Park. Plantings will help stabilize the banks.

\$9 Million in Residential Street Repairs Planned

ayor Tom Perciak said the city will repair 35 concrete streets in 2021.

He made the announcement during his annual State of the City address May 11.

The project will cost a little over \$9 million.

The streets in line for repair are:

Ward 1 — Forest Point Place, Park Moss Avenue, Bittersweet Circle, Lake Forest Drive, Leawood Oval, Kettering Oval, River Ridge Road and Sunridge Circle.

Ward 2 — Laurell Circle, Blazing Star Drive, Deer Ridge Circle, Currier Drive, Squirrel Hollow, Windward Way,



Golden Star Drive, Bear Creek Lane and Eagles Nest Circle.

Ward 3 — Heather Lane, Creek Stone Circle, Clear Book Circle, Meadowgrass Road, Watercress Road, Idlewood Drive, Pamela Drive, Briarwood Lane, Shagbark Trail, Creek Moss Lane and Pebble Brook Lane. Ward 4 — Driftwood Court, Hemlock Circle, Pinewood Drive, White Bark Drive, Holly Circle, Wildwood Lane and Windsor Castle Lane.

In addition, the city's Service Department will repair and repave a number of asphalt roads this summer. Those streets will be named later.

Residents: Beware the 'Distraction' Burglary

Police urge residents to be aware of a type of burglary that happens while you're at home — often while you're in the next room or just outside the door.

In a distraction burglary, someone typically comes to your door claiming to be a contractor or offering to



perform a service at your home. The visitor tries to lure you outside to look at an alleged problem, or asks to come inside. Meanwhile, an accomplice is slipping unnoticed into another part of your house and grabbing valuables.

In one case, a young woman came to a resident's home and, claiming she was moving in next door, asked to see the view of her new back yard from the resident's window.

Police say you should always make sure someone at your door has a solicitor's permit issued by the city of Strongsville, and should be wary if a stranger engages you in conversation while you're working in the yard.

Companies Bringing Hundreds of New Jobs to Town

N ew projects in the city's four business parks are bringing literally hundreds of new jobs to Strongsville.

OMEC, a smart card manufacturer from Shanghai, China is opening its first North American location on Dow Circle in Strongsville, bringing 200 new jobs.

Infinium Wall Systems,

which makes glass walls, has built a 120,000-square-foot corporate headquarters on Prospect Road, with the potential for 200 new jobs.

PLIDCO, a pipeline development company that repairs

oil pipelines, has purchased the 233,000-square-foot former DeMag building and will move its corporate headquarters to Strongsville in June with 100 new employees. Union Home Mortgage has expanded its headquarters into a 106,000-square-foot campus on Dow Circle and has committed to the creation of 450 new jobs here.

Businesses on the Move

Work continues on the new **Freddy's Frozen Custard and Steakburgers**, which is renovating the former Burger King on Pearl Road for its new restaurant.

Lux'Jorious Fish Spa has opened in SouthPark Mall, on the upper level in the Dillard's wing. It is the second location for the business, joining the original spa in Woodmere.

Construction is under way on the new **Arby's** restaurant on Pearl at Whitney, the site of the former Mad Cactus.

Discount Drug Mart is also building its second Strongsville location on Pearl Road in front of Lowe's.
