State of the City Address will be Delayed in 2021

A ayor Tom Perciak usually delivers his annual State of the City address in March, but the event will be pushed back this year due to the coronavirus pandemic.

The mayor is tentatively scheduled to speak this year on May 11. That date could change.

The speech is part of the Strongsville Chamber of Commerce's monthly luncheon and takes place at the Ehrnfelt Recreation Center. The public is invited to the lunch.

Social distancing and mask requirements will be followed at the event.

Fire Department Marks 50 Years as Full-Time Unit

The Strongsville Fire Department is celebrating its 50th anniversary as a fulltime unit in 2021.

Back in 1971, when the department transitioned from volunteer to full-time, the firefighters had a decision to make: leave their current careers to take on \$8,000-ayear positions with the city or remain volunteers, assisting when needed.

Ultimately, 16 men chose to come on board full time, led by Chief Charles Graves, who left his slaughterhouse business to serve the community.

That first year, they made 171 EMS runs and responded to 124 fire incidents — but



more important, laid the foundation for the 61-person department Strongsville has today.

Last year, the highly trained crew of Strongsville firefighter -paramedics handled a total of 4,085 medical calls and 1,699 fire-related incidents.



Coyotes are on the Move This Time of Year: Watch Pets

Animal Control Officer Chuck McCleary advises residents to take extra precautions when letting their pets outside.

First, scan your yard to make

sure no coyotes are lurking before letting your dog out. Don't leave your dog unattended, and if you have cats, don't let them outside — especially overnight.

Police to Host Safety Village for Kindergartners

ast summer, the pandemic forced the city to cancel the popular Safety Town program, designed for kids about to enter kindergarten.

next fall can attend Safety Village, a one-day event that will cover many of the lessons taught in the traditional Safety Town, including stranger danger, calling 911, and bus, bike and fire safety.
