# Lots of Action in Strongsville's Retail World

**S** trongsville's retail world is seeing lots of action lately, with both existing storefronts being filled and new construction.

In the last couple months, BurgerFI has opened in the former Boston Market location on Pearl Road; Chieffalo's has moved into its brand new auto repair building on Pearl; and Sephora has opened in the former Famous Footwear spot in the Greens of Strongsville.

Cleaveland Grocers and Grill, which suffered a fire at its Brook Park location, is opening at 17024 Pearl Road with a Halal menu including burgers, fries, grilled chicken and



chopped cheese.

Also, Strongsville Bullion and Coin Exchange is now operating at 13500 Pearl Road.

And Schnitz Ale Brewery, which took over the former Brew Kettle space on Progress Drive, is opening a 50-seat tasting room in March. Further ahead, Amigo's is expected to reopen as Taco Macho, which offers Mexican street cuisine.

BrightPath Kids is seeking approval to build a daycare center on two acres next to GetGo on Pearl Road. And two motels will be razed to make way for a Sheetz and a Dunkin'.

# If Skunks Stomp their Little Feet, Better Back Off

B efore you let your dogs out this time of year, make a little noise and give skunks time to move away, advises Animal Control Officer Chuck McCleary.

If you come face to face with a skunk, stay calm and talk softly to let him know you're there -- skunks have poor eyesight. They are sweet natured and don't want to spray you.

Skunks will give several warnings if they are scared: 1. They will stomp their front feet. 2. They will turn their backs to you. 3. They will do a handstand.

Also, it's common for skunks



to get their heads stuck in cans or cups. If you see one, throw a towel over him and just pull the object off.

# **Roundabout Construction Starting this Month**

Work is expected to start in mid-March on a roundabout that replaces an existing three-way stop in the Town Center area.

The intersection of Westwood, Zvernia and Roe will become a roundabout as part of the Town Center enhancement project.

During construction, the entire intersection will be closed, meaning there will be no cutthrough traffic.

The Strongsville Communication Center, Historical Village and Strongsville Food Bank will be accessed from Pearl Road on Zverina Drive.

#### The police station, Mayor's Court, City Council chambers and the Strongsville Library will also be accessed from Pearl Road on Westwood Drive.

#### **Businesses on the Move**

**Valley Storage**, 12878 Pearl Road, is expanding. The storage facility is adding 21,206 square feet to its existing building and also constructing another 10,600-square-foot new building.

Plans are progressing for two projects that involve motels being razed and new retail construction.

First, Super 8 Motel on Royalton Road has been demolished so that a **Sheetz** gas station can be built on the site. It will be the third Sheetz in Strongsville.

On Pearl Road, the Village Motel will also be torn down to make way for a new **Dunkin'** to be built.
