

**SUMMARY OF CAUCUS DISCUSSION AND MINUTES OF THE STRONGSVILLE CITY COUNCIL
REGULAR MEETING HELD ON MONDAY, APRIL 20, 2020.**

The Council of the City of Strongsville met in the Caucus Room at the Mike Kalinich Sr. City Council Chamber, 18688 Royalton Road, on **Monday, April 20, 2020 at 7:45 p.m.**

Present: Council Members: Matthew A. Schonhut, Annmarie P. Roff, James A. Kaminski, Gordon C. Short Joseph C. DeMio, Kelly A. Kosek and James E. Carbone. Also Present: Clerk of Council Aimee Pientka. **Administration:** Mayor Thomas P. Perciak, Law Director Neal M. Council President Schonhut called the caucus to order at 7:45 p.m.

The following Council Committees met to review legislation on the agenda:

Planning, Zoning & Engineering Committee: Chairman Schonhut advised Ordinance No. 2020-064 is to modify the contract with Euthenics Inc., in connection with the replacement of the culvert and appurtenances under The Greens of Strongsville. This will be an increase of \$28,112.00; thereby increasing the total contract cost to \$193,770.00. Mr. Jamison advised because this is without public bidding, all 7 votes of council are required for this legislation to pass. Mr. Short asked for confirmation that this is just for engineering services and plans to design and configure the project; that there will be additional costs down the road to actually build the retaining wall and repair the culvert. Mayor Perciak advised that is correct. The recommendation was to suspend and adopt that legislation. Ordinance No. 2020-065 is to rezone property located at 21600 Royalton Road from GI (General Industrial) classification to SR-1 (Senior Residence) classification (PPN 392-14-003). This will be placed on first reading and referred to the Planning Commission for their recommendation. Ordinance No. 2020-066 is to rezone property located at Royalton Road and Webster Road from PF (Public Facilities) classification to R1-75 (One Family 75) classification (Part of PPN 398-28-007); and from PF (Public Facilities) classification to LB (Local Business) classification (Part of PPN 398-28-009). This will be placed on first reading and referred to the Planning Commission for their recommendation.

Public Service & Conservation Committee: Chairman Kaminski advised Ordinance No. 2020-067 is to enter into a contract for improvements to various streets in connection with the 2020 pavement reconstruction program. The contract is with TRI MOR Corporation in an amount not to exceed \$5,873,109.50. The recommendation was to suspend and adopt that legislation. Ordinance No. 2020-068 is to enter into a contract for the purchase of general pavement services for 2020 for use by the service department. The contract is with Crossroads Asphalt Recycling, Inc. in a total amount not to exceed \$2,092,611.00. The recommendation was to suspend and adopt that legislation. Ordinance No. 2020-069 is to authorize the sale by internet auction certain obsolete property no longer needed for any municipal purpose for use by the service department. The recommendation was to suspend and adopt that legislation. Note – Ms. Kosek will be abstaining from voting on Ordinance Nos. 2020-068 and 2020-069 because her law firm represents those companies.

Public Safety and Health Committee: Chairman Short recommended suspension and adoption for Ordinance No. 2020-070; an ordinance authorizing the mayor to enter into a contract for the purchase of 1 new ambulance with related vehicle modifications. The contract is with Braun Industries, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$234,231.00. This is to replace the ambulance that was involved in an accident earlier this year.

Finance Committee: Chairman DeMio advised Resolution No. 2020-062 is to adopt the alternative tax budget information for the city for Fiscal Year 2021. The recommendation was to suspend and adopt that legislation.

Mr. DeMio asked for confirmation that the city has no plans to lay off any emergency service employee (police, fire and dispatch). Mayor Perciak advised that is correct. Mayor Perciak advised he was on a teleconference call with Congressman Anthony Gonzalez attempting to petition dollars to augment our city's budget for emergency personnel.

MINUTES OF THE STRONGSVILLE CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING HELD ON MONDAY, APRIL 20, 2020 IN THE MIKE KALINICH SR. CITY COUNCIL CHAMBERS.

CALL TO ORDER:

Council President Schonhut called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m. All joined in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Mr. Schonhut – As we did at our last meeting, a few council members decided to volunteer and stay home for this meeting: Ms. Kosek, Ms. Roff and Mr. Kaminski, to try to keep us all as safe as we possibly can be; so we thank them again for that.

COMMENTS ON MINUTES:

The Minutes of the Regular Council Meeting held on April 6, 2020 were approved as submitted.

APPOINTMENTS, CONFIRMATIONS, AWARDS AND RECOGNITIONS:

REPORTS OF COUNCIL COMMITTEES:

SCHOOL BOARD – Mr. Carbone: Yes, at the last school board meeting, it was livestreamed again. They approved the purchase of a wheel loader at \$75,000.00 and a F350 truck at \$39,000.00. The funds came out of their permanent improvement fund. They approved the purchase of Chromebooks for \$150,000.00 for all incoming freshman. They want to keep that 1 for 1 with technology for all the high school students. Congratulations to the former elementary secretary, Paula Spokane. She's now going up to the high school to be the secretary for the athletic office. Strongsville earned the National Distinction for best communities for music and education. This is their 7th straight year. They are one of 47 districts out of 600 plus in Ohio and one of 750 nationwide. The next work session will be Thursday, May 7th.

Mr. Schonhut – Thank you Mr. Carbone, any other comments or statements under school board?

SOUTHWEST GENERAL HEALTH SYSTEM – Mr. Short: Thank you Mr. Schonhut, we have not had a board meeting since our last council meeting; although to his credit, the CEO, Bill Young, has been keeping the communities updated with weekly updates. Just a few quick things I would like to note from his update from Friday, April 17th. The initial focus for Southwest was it would experience about a 300% surge in patient volume due to COVID-19. That has not happened, which is good news for this area; so they have shifted to handling a lower volume of potential small surges of patients for potential infected hotspots. They are now also looking, as we begin to emerge from the COVID-19 crisis, to an increase in expected patient volumes due to elective surgeries and all that coming to be back allowed by the governor. To date, as of Friday the 17th, there were 47 confirmed positive COVID-19 patients at the hospital, 11 over the past week, with some additional patients being admitted with symptoms but not yet confirmed by testing. Inpatient discharges are down 22%, year of volume is down 45%, and total surgeries are down 76%. Again, the volume has not been there that was initially expected; however, if anyone is experiencing any symptoms or believe that they could be infected with COVID-19, Southwest General does have a COVID-19, 24 hour hotline; that number is (440) 816-8962. Again, if you think you may have symptoms, please call the hotline at (440) 816-8962. That will conclude my report, but I will happily take any questions.

Mr. Schonhut – Thank you Mr. Short for the timely information on everything right now. Is there any questions for Mr. Short?

BUILDING AND UTILITIES – DeMio: There is no report on the agenda tonight, no ordinances I believe scheduled at this point; otherwise, I will field questions.

Mr. Schonhut – The only comment that I will have, and it was our dearest Aimee's idea, and I think she wanted to recognize Tony Biondillo here, even though he is not here tonight. I'm sure he's either riding his motorcycle on this nice night or drinking a beer in a lawn chair; so he'll probably never see this, but we're going to stand up and clap for Tony and thank him for his many years of service here.

Mr. Schonhut – We appreciate you Tony and best of luck to you. Anything else out of that committee?

COMMUNICATIONS AND TECHNOLOGY – Ms. Roff: I do not have anything at this time, but I will take any questions.

Mr. Schonhut – Thank you Ms. Roff – Any questions?

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT – Mr. Carbone: Yes, last Friday was the last day for businesses to reach out to the city and submit a request to review our downtown plan that came to council a couple of meetings ago that originated from our economic development meeting and our economic development committee. We're proud to say that we had 11 consultants, outside consultants, interested in the plan, which is very good. I want to thank George Smerigan, our city planner, for helping me out with that. We're going to wait with everything going on and we're going to see where we're at in a couple of months and revisit this. We're also looking, we're going to wait till May 1st, to see where we're at with our country and with the State of Ohio with everything going on, to really set a next meeting. I'd like to get everybody back together, update them, but right now health and safety is first and foremost. I did want to update everybody on the downtown plan and also look at the future with the mall, what we can do there, probably now more than ever there might need to be some assistance and some opportunities there. Lastly, I have obtained a lot of information, been working with Congressman Anthony Gonzales, with opportunity for small businesses. If anybody wants to reach out to me, I'd be happy to talk with them via the phone, drop off any literature, but also I know the mayor and Brent Painter are always on hand to talk and help any businesses in our community. Mayor, did you want to say something?

Mayor Perciak – Jim, thank you and thank you for being on the call the other day with our congressman. I thank you for your remarks to the congressman; and same thing with Gordon Short-the more the merrier in these conversations. They understand we are a unified front. Yes, we have been involved; we have worked with the individual banks, we have worked with the individual small businesses; we forwarded to them all the necessary information they needed to bring to their bank to go online, to get the application-what the banks were expecting. We had constant involvement, especially the first weekend-the whole weekend; so we were quite busy that weekend and I'm glad that you extended the olive branch also because they need all the help they can get. We're waiting to hear if there's going to be additional assistance passed by The House and The Senate. We were hoping to have it done by today; it's still not done...as of 6:30 p.m. it wasn't anyway. That, again, will enable the small business man and woman to apply for this assistance. A lot of the individuals have already received their money; it is in their account.

Mr. Carbone – And I think some businesses were concerned, a little frustrated, because the first round of money is already dried up. I keep on encouraging them...

Mayor Perciak – You are 100% accurate. They are...they are frustrated, they were frustrated with the process and we're just glad that a lot of people work through the process and they are the beneficiaries of the process; so thank you.

Mr. Carbone – So keep on pushing and keep on...because there might be another round of funds and relief there.

Mayor Perciak – We hope here in the next day.

Ms. Roff – Mayor and Jim, did you guys...and Gordon, was there a large amount of people that were left out from the small businesses that...

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT – Mr. Carbone (cont'd):

Mayor Perciak – Ann, we can't answer that because that is proprietary information between the bank and their customer. All we know is we encourage them to get into their bank. Everything was done electronically. Some individuals, as of Friday, we're still waiting to hear, that I know.

Ms. Roff – Okay, I didn't know if anyone reached out to you individually looking for help or guidance...

Mayor Perciak – Right, any time you want...

Ms. Roff - ...in on that deadline, so thank you.

Mr. Carbone – That ends my report, if there are any other questions?

FINANCE – Mr. DeMio: Thank you, we talked lightly about the alternative tax budget information for Fiscal 2021 and that it be passed tonight. That's Resolution No. 2020-062 for those that are listening. Also, we did talk about there will be no layoffs of the police, fire, ems, dispatch. I asked the mayor that question on the record in caucus. Our finance director is here as well and he was pretty clear; if he wants to add to that he may; if not, I will close the committee unless there's any other questions.

Mayor Perciak – I will add to it Mr. DeMio if I may. The reason I want to add to it, if for some reason a second wave of this COVID-19 comes in the Fall, all bets are off because as you are well aware and every member of council and so many people in the financial world, and not only this municipality but every municipality in every county government, in every state government, we don't have the option of operating in the red, in the deficit position. Should a second round of this happen again, I can't tell you what's it's going to be because we'll have to see where our finances are; but where we're at today, we're doing our very best to make certain that does not happen.

Mr. DeMio – There's not been any under communication to anyone?

Mayor Perciak – No, there's been no...we have never once, never once in any meeting, implied to any police officer, fireman, paramedic or dispatcher that we have any plans at this time of furloughing them, period.

Mr. Kaminski – And Joe, if I could make a comment.

Mr. DeMio – Please, it's Jim Kaminski, right Jim?

Mr. Kaminski – Yes, and so on the call with Anthony Gonzales the other day, Mayor Perciak was the first mayor to chime in and ask of the federal assistance to the municipalities; so I thought that was a fantastic question. The answer from Anthony was that would be the next round after this small business loan was getting replenished for a second round when they're planning to explore several (unintelligible). I know mayor you're already on that, I just wanted to mention that as well, a possibility as well, hopefully that will come through.

REPORTS OF COUNCIL COMMITTEES (cont'd):

FINANCE – Mr. DeMio (cont'd):

Mayor Perciak – And Jim, thank you again for being there because as I said, the more the merrier on these calls and the more we're all on the same page asking for the same help and cooperation. I think they pay far more attention as to what we're doing here. I also want to thank Mayor DeGeeter from the City of Parma for working so closely with the congressman and basically, saying the same things we are; however, he's in a little different situation than we are here. He's already announced the furloughing of 40 people; to the best of my knowledge, all non-safety people; but you can see they are moving quickly. The City of North Olmsted has announced a reduction. I think they have 20 people Jim?

Mr. Carbone – 20 or 30.

Mayor Perciak – 20 people going to 20 hours. The county has announced that there's a mandatory 80 hour non-paid furlough time; so we're not alone in this. We're just going to have to wait and see.

Mr. Kaminski – We would be in worse shape if we didn't have reserves.

Mayor Perciak – Jim, no question, if we did not manage our balance sheet the way we have in the last decade...no I'm saying decade, 10 years, because it has to be 10 years in order to do what we've been able to do, we would not be in the position to talk about the things we are talking about today. You are 100% there.

Mr. Kaminski – I remember when it all started.

Mr. DeMio – I think with that said, unless there's any other questions on any other issues or if our finance director has anything else or anything you would like to add Matt, I will close the committee.

PLANNING, ZONING AND ENGINEERING – Mr. Schonhut: Ordinance No. 2020-064 is an increase in the contract with Euthenics for engineering services for the culvert project by The Greens of Strongsville. It's an increase of around \$28,000.00. The recommendation on that is to suspend and adopt. We also have Ordinance No. 2020-065 which is a rezoning on Royalton Road near Vitalia from general industrial to senior residence. That will be placed on first reading and sent over to the planning commission. Lastly, Ordinance No. 2020-066 is a rezoning at the corner of Webster Road and Royalton Road, from public facilities to R1-75; and a different portion from public facilities to local business. That also will be placed on first reading and sent over to the planning commission. That is all that I have unless anybody has any questions, comments or concerns on any of that?

PUBLIC SAFETY AND HEALTH – Mr. Short: Thank you Mr. Schonhut, we have one ordinance on tonight's agenda, it's Ordinance No. 2020-070. This is to replace an ambulance that was totaled in an accident earlier this year. The recommendation there is to suspend and adopt. That will close my report but I will happily take any questions.

Ordinance No. 2020-068 allows the mayor to enter into a contract for general pavement services for 2020. Lastly, Ordinance No. 2020-069 which authorizes the sale of obsolete property through the internet auction. All 3 of these ordinances are suspend and adopt for this evening, thank you.

Mr. Schonhut – Any questions for Mr. Kaminski?

RECREATION AND COMMUNITY SERVICES – Ms. Kosek: We have no ordinances or resolutions on the agenda tonight but if anyone has any questions, I'd be happy to answer them; otherwise, you could close the committee Matt.

Mr. Schonhut – Any questions for Ms. Kosek?

Ms. Roff – Matt, if we could go back and possibly we could just maybe, I'm not sure...we're obviously going to go by what our governor says, but where maybe rec falls into opening back up...at what tier they would fit into as far as the first, second, third type of thing. People have been asking questions and I told them that... (Unintelligible)

Mr. Schonhut – I'll default to the mayor on that question.

Mayor Perciak – Thank you Mr. President, Ann, we don't know what the governor is going to do. We've been on conference calls with him; both in my capacity as mayor of the City of Strongsville and as President of the Mayor's Association. As far as the rec centers, the senior centers, any inside meetings of people, we have received no directives as of today. The only thing, obviously, what we heard is what you heard, is that he closed the schools for the rest of the year. They're strong on the social distancing and our human resource director, Steve Kilo, and Bryan Bogre, our rec director, already have been meeting and trying to implement a plan that may work, when and if we can, reopen the facility; simply because of the social distancing. It's not going to be an easy task; so we're really going to need further instruction from them as to what they expect; and then we'll have to see what we can actually do to comply with the guidelines that they set forth. Mr. Law Director, did I miss anything there?

Mr. Jamison – No, you're correct mayor. We actually even discussed it this morning at the staff meeting. It's a fluid situation to the extent that, as the mayor said, we're waiting for direction from the governor's office going forward. I know that the human resource's director and recreation director have been talking about what options are available, when they're able to do so, so that we can provide a safe environment for those individuals that want to come and use the facility. We're planning for it, but we just don't know what the parameters are yet. Once we know that, then obviously the mayor and his staff will make that decision.

Mayor Perciak – We're working on it Ann, believe.

Ms. Roff – I know, I know, thank you, I was just trying to get some feedback for the public. I know you guys are (unintelligible). That's a big job; I appreciate that.

REPORTS OF COUNCIL COMMITTEES (cont'd):

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE – Mr. Schonhut: We have nothing under this tonight.

REPORTS AND COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR, DIRECTORS OF DEPARTMENTS AND OTHER OFFICERS:

MAYOR PERCIAK: Thank you again Mr. President, nothing more than to add than what I have already discussed with all the members of council and my administration. If you have any questions of me, I'll be happy to answer them.

Mr. Schonhut – Does anybody have any questions?

FINANCE DEPARTMENT – Mr. Dubovec: Thank you Mr. President, funds are available for all ordinances and resolutions on this evening's agenda require certification of funding and that will conclude my report, thank you.

LAW DEPARTMENT – Mr. Jamison: Thank you, all ordinances and resolutions are in proper legal form. That concludes my report.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION:

Mr. Schonhut – That brings us to audience participation. We do have one person signed in, Mr. Harry Drennan. You can come to the microphone; we do ask that you keep your comments to approximately 5 minutes. State your name and address and please spell it for the record and we will take it from there, welcome.

Harry Drennan, 13597 Drake Road, Strongsville, OH: Spell my name or my address?

Mr. Schonhut – Your name.

Mr. Drennan – Harry A. Drennan, 13597 Drake Road. I've lived there since 1998. I was an employee of the city from 1993 till 2019 at the fire department. If I may, I consider myself a subject matter expert in this arena. I was shown an official City of Strongsville communication today that announced the cessation of all overtime for the fire department. I feel, and I implore you, to tap into whatever reserves we have to maintain that 13 firemedic minimum which is essential to the operation of the department, both for citizens...me as a resident, and the safety of these firefighters. You cannot drop below that 13. I'm gratified that you're buying an ambulance; it does you no good without people who know how to operate it or treat patients. Every State of the City address, I've never missed one, opens with a commitment to public safety. I apologize, but my government is talking out of both sides of their mouth right now. You are or you aren't. I know how many people it takes to treat a critically ill patient or put out a house fire. I'm very, very disappointed. Your fiscal management mayor has be unimpeachable up until today. This is a rainy day if ever we've had one. The same goes for police and the dispatchers. We are at the minimum. At one time when I worked for the fire department, there were 21 people per shift. They decided to go to 18 because it was cheaper to pay overtime than to hire additional employees. So now, it is a very, very lean operation and it can't be done without overtime due to sickness, injuries...you don't want people who are ill coming to work- police, fire, ems or dispatch. This is one arena where there should be no compromise. If we lose one of those Aaa's to get through this crisis, I will accept that. I have never complained about my taxes because I know I am being served by the finest public safety organization in Ohio, thank you.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION (cont'd):

Mr. Schonhut – Thank you Mr. Drennan, and I'm sure we'll have discussions about everything that is going on here at the city, and our finances, in the near future- try to get a better grasp on what we can and cannot do moving forward. Given that there is nobody else signed in, I'm assuming that is all that we have here for audience participation tonight.


