Dates set for Rib Burnoff, Homecoming

Strongsville's two major summer festivals on the Commons are right around the corner.

The Strongsville City Club Rib Burnoff will run June 20-22 with its usual array of awardwinning ribbers and plenty of sides and snacks, plus inflatables for the kids and live entertainment nightly.

Strongsville Homecoming, sponsored by the Strongsville Chamber of Commerce, is set for July 17-20 with rides, carnival games, food and live entertainment daily.

It will kick off with the Homecoming Parade on July 17.

Mayor Outlines Upcoming Road, Parks Projects

citywide traffic signal upgrade, the final leg of the Pearl Road resurfacing project and a long-awaited road widening are among the infrastructure improvements on tap for 2019, Mayor Tom Perciak has announced.

The mayor outlined the soonto-begin projects during his State of the City address March 19. A rundown:

Signals — All 57 signalized intersections will be upgraded with new technology to improve traffic flow.

Pearl Road — The final leg of the resurfacing project will repave Pearl from the Ohio



Turnpike bridge through Sprague Road.

Sprague Road — The longawaited widening of Sprague from Webster Road to West 130th Street is expected to start in the fall.

Town Center — Improvements will be made to the Pearl-Royalton intersection to beautify the area and improve pedestrian safety.

Boston Road — The road will be resurfaced from Prospect Road to Marks Road.

Surrarrer Park Phase 2 — More additions to the newly renovated park will include a 75-foot zip line, slides and more climbing structures.

Two New Restaurants Announced at Royalton Collection

Royalton Collection, the retail office complex on Route 82 across from SouthPark Mall, continues to add tenants as developers prepare to start construction this spring.

The newest additions are both places to eat — Outback Steakhouse and Tropical Smoothie Café.

They will join the alreadyannounced anchor tenant Home Goods, a kitchen, bedding, bath and accent furniture store, and Panera Bread, which will move from its current location just east on Royalton Road.

Home Goods will occupy most of a 30,500-square-foot retail space, the largest of four retail buildings planned at the site.



The existing office building, formerly occupied by Medical Mutual, is currently being renovated by Foundation Software, which is expanding.

Drop off Household Hazardous Waste May 2-4

he first of two 2018 Household Hazardous Waste
Collections is set for May 2-4 at
the Service Center, 16099 Foltz
Pkwy.

Residents can drop off their household products 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. May 2 and 3, and 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday, May 4.

Materials accepted include oil or solvent-based paint (no latex paint), varnish, mineral spirits, caustic household cleaners, adhesives, gasoline, sealers, polyurethane, herbicides, automotive fluids, roof tar, lighter fluid, primers and coatings, shellac, pesticides, motor oil, driveway sealer, mercury, paint thinner, turpentine, fungicides, car batteries, and kerosene.

LATEX PAINT IS NOT ACCEPTED.

To dispose of latex paint, leave the lid off to dry up the paint, or mix in a drying agent, then place it out with your regular trash for collection.
