Let Mike Campbell never imagined his job would involve browsing the internet for cartoon characters and movie quotes.

But now that he’s started, the community doesn’t want him to stop.

Campbell, who handles the police department’s Facebook page, runs a daily meme reminding residents — in a humorous way — to lock their car doors.

“We noticed we’d get rashes of cars entered at night — and they were all unlocked,” Campbell said.

The memes were a way to get people’s attention.



And they seem to be working.

“We’ve noticed a dramatic decrease in the number of cars entered,” Campbell said. “Locking your doors is an easy way not to become a victim.”

The memes have become a

hit with the public. Campbell recently ran a Facebook survey to ask if residents were tired of them or if he should continue.

The response was overwhelming: Keep it up.

“So I guess I’ll be doing them a while longer,” he said.

'Daily Safety Caller' Ready to Check In with Seniors

Senior citizens who live on their own will be the focus of a new safety program Strongsville is launching soon.

The Daily Safety Caller program is designed to check in with seniors daily to make sure they're doing all right — and send help if there's a problem.

Seniors who sign up for the program will receive an automated call every morning. If they answer the phone, the system will log that they are fine.

If there's no answer, though, the system will call again in a few minutes — maybe the resident didn't hear the phone or just couldn't answer in time.

But if there's still no answer, the system will call or text the resident's emergency contact, who will then either check on the resident personally or ask the police department to do so.

Safety forces would enter the home through a lockbox installed on the door.

Sign-ups are expected to start this month or in March.
