Mayor Perciak will Address City March 21

Save the date — the mayor's annual State of the City address is set to take place on Tuesday, March 21.

Mayor Tom Perciak will talk about the city's fiscal health, business growth and the upcoming improvements to the Town Center area.

He delivers the speech during the Strongsville Chamber of Commerce's monthly business luncheon. It usually sells out, so reserve a seat early at strongsvillechamber.com.

Tax Diversity: City's Eggs aren't All in One Basket

n some cities, a single industry can bear the weight of the community's fiscal health.

A factory, say, or a major hospital sometimes contributes a huge chunk of the income taxes the city collects, making the community dependent on that source of revenue to operate.

Strongsville is NOT one of those cities.

Here, the top 10 contributors to the city's income tax collections combined make up only about 12 percent of the total income tax revenue. That means Strongsville is not dependent on even its biggest employers for its overall



fiscal health.

"It's a great position to be in," Economic Development Director Brent Painter said. "We're fortunate to have a very broad base of companies operating in our business parks and retail centers."

What's more, the tax diversity is growing as the business

parks thrive. In 2003, the top 10 income tax withholders in Strongsville contributed 18.69 percent of the city's income taxes.

That figure has shrunk over the years until in 2022, the top 10 accounted for only 12.27 percent of the city's income tax collections.
