State of the City Address is set for March 21

A ayor Tom Perciak will deliver his annual State of the City address on March 21 at the Ehrnfelt Rec Center.

The speech is part of the Strongsville Chamber of Commerce's monthly luncheon. The event starts at 11:15 a.m.

The mayor will talk about a variety of topics, including the upcoming improvements to the Town Center area — a pavilion, splash pad, playgrounds and more.

Coming Soon: New Town Center Amenities

Plans are being finalized for enhancements to the Town Center, which will bring a splash pad, playground, a pavilion and more to the area west of the Rec Center.

The overall Town Center Enhancement Project will make the entire center of town more walkable with new sidewalks and trails that will connect the amenities, including a safe walkway from Pearl Road. Freedom Trail will also be improved and feature a walkway to the Commons.

Mayor Tom Perciak said the enhancement will also "improve the quality of life for residents" with its familyoriented amenities.



Those feature an interactive fountain; a community pavilion with enclosed event space and outdoor fireplace; a new playground accessible to children of all ability levels; and new tennis, pickleball, sand volleyball and half-court basketball courts. There will also be a food truck court and a large green space for events.

Construction will run through the summer and fall, with the amenities expected to open in spring 2024.

Coyotes are on the Move in the Early Spring: Watch Pets

t's mating season for coyotes, making the animals more active and likely to be seen during daylight hours.

Animal Control Officer Chuck McCleary advises residents to take extra precautions when letting their pets outside.

First, scan your yard to make

sure no coyotes are lurking before letting your dog out. Don't leave your dog unattended, and if you have cats, don't let them outside — especially overnight.

There are also ways to animal -proof your property so coyotes and other wildlife don't hang around.

If Skunks Stomp their Little Feet, Back Off

Before you let your dogs out this time of year, make a little noise and give skunks time to move out of your yard, advises Animal Control Officer Chuck McCleary.

If you come face to face with a skunk, stay calm and talk softly to let him know you're there -- skunks have poor eyesight. They are sweet natured and don't want to spray you.



Skunks will give several warnings if they are scared: 1. They will stomp their front feet. 2.

They will turn their backs to you. 3. They will do a handstand.

If a pet is sprayed, mix a paste from Dawn dish soap, peroxide and baking soda and spread it on the area. Let sit 10 minutes, rinse and repeat.

Also, please don't litter, and rinse out containers you are recycling. Every year, our ACO rescues skunks with cans, yogurt cups, etc. stuck on their heads. If you see one, throw a towel over him and just pull the object off.
