Memorial Day Parade and Ceremony Set

The annual Memorial Day parade and ceremony will take place Monday, May 28.

The parade steps off at 11 a.m. from St. Joseph Church and heads south on Pearl Road to Zverina Lane. It ends at the Freedom Trail gazebo with a short ceremony.

Mayor Tom Perciak will be among the speakers. The Strongsville High School marching band is expected to participate in both the parade and ceremony.

The event is sponsored by Strongsville VFW Post 3345 to honor the nation's fallen military heroes.

More Improvements Coming to Town Center

The intersection of Pearl and Royalton roads will see an upgrade this summer to improve pedestrian safety and access to the Town Center area.

Pedestrian signals and curb ramps will be upgraded at the intersection of Pearl and Royalton, Pearl and Westwood, and Pearl at Strongsville Middle School.

Stamped concrete crosswalks will be added, as will handi-capped-accessible sloped curbs with "truncated domes" that vision-impaired pedestrians will be able to feel.

At the Pearl-Royalton corner,



the traffic signals will be upgraded -- including new signal mast arms -- and pedestrian refuge islands will be added.

In addition, wayfinding signs, crosswalks and bike racks will be added to Freedom Trail.

The city received a \$141,000 grant to pay a portion of the

cost of the project.

The city has already installed stamped-concrete crosswalks, which are textured to improve visibility, at locations along Westwood Drive and Zverina Lane.

Construction will take about three months.

Drop Off Household Hazardous Waste May 3-5

The first of the two 2016 Household Hazardous Waste Collections is set for May 3-5 at the Service Center, 16099 Foltz Pkwy.

Residents can drop off their household products 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. May 3-4 and 8 a.m. to noon Saturday, May 5.



Materials accepted include oil or solvent-based paint (no latex paint), varnish, mineral spirits, caustic household cleaners, adhesives, gasoline, sealers, polyurethane, herbicides, automotive fluids, roof tar, lighter fluid, primers and coatings, shellac, pesticides, motor oil, driveway sealer, mercury, paint thinner, turpentine, fungicides, car batteries and kerosene.

LATEX PAINT IS NOT ACCEPTED. To dispose of latex paint, leave the lid off to dry up the paint — or mix in a drying agent available at home improvement stores — then place it out with your regular trash for collection. **ALSO NOT ACCEPTED:** Rechargeable batteries and fluorescent bulbs, including CFLs.
