Leaf Collection Continues throughout November

S ervice Department crews will continue their annual fall leaf collection through at least November.

More collection weeks will likely be added.

If you live north of Royalton Road, crews will be back on your street the weeks of Nov. 4 and Nov. 18.

If you live south of Royalton, expect a pick -up the weeks of Nov. 11 and Nov. 25.

Have your leaves piled near the street by 7 a.m. Monday morning. After pick-up ends, bagged leaves may be set out with your regular trash.

Mayor Perciak Delivers Update on City Projects

Strongsville will open up 85.7 acres of new industrial land by extending Foltz Parkway to the south and will also see three new housing developments and a new fire station soon, Mayor Tom Perciak said.

Perciak, offering a city update speech Oct. 15, said the city will extend Foltz Parkway



about 2,000 feet. up "the largest greenfield land site in Cuyahoga County" for industrial development "so we can create more new jobs."

Work will start next year on a fifth fire station in the center of town, the mayor noted.

Developers are also building single family homes and detached villas on Prospect Road and luxury townhouses on Marks Road, he said.

Don't Invite Thieves into Your Car by Leaving it Unlocked

Police are urging residents to lock their car doors at night to prevent thefts.

Experts say thefts from vehicles are often crimes of opportunity.

Thieves will walk down a residential street at night trying car doors.

If it's locked, they move on. If one opens, they help themselves to what's inside the vehicle.

Police say vehicles in several Strongsville neighborhoods have been targeted in the last few months. Also, don't leave valuable items in your vehicles. The sight of a laptop or briefcase or purse might be enough to tempt a thief to break a window to get inside. Park in a well-lit area, if you can.

And double check each night to make sure your overhead garage door is closed.

Businesses on the Move

Another Broken Egg Café is set to move into the building on north Pearl Road vacated by O'Charley's. The eatery, which has a location at Crocker Park, is open for breakfast and lunch and features specialty breakfast items, lunch entrees and a full bar.

The Original Pancake House will take over the former Rico's restaurant (before that, Gourme) at the corner of Pearl and Shurmer roads. They offer a variety of pancakes, crepes, waffles, eggs and other breakfasts as well as sandwiches and other lunch choices.
