he annual Breakfast on the Bridge is set for Sept. 17 on the Ehrnfelt Covered Bridge on Whitney Road in the Cleveland Metroparks.

City, Police Take Aim at Heroin/Opioid Crisis

When safety forces here respond to a drug overdose, they'll no longer bid the patient farewell at the hospital.

Within 72 hours of the patient's release, a Quick Response Team (police, a paramedic, a treatment specialist and a volunteer from a Strongsville church coalition) will visit the person at home -- with his or her family -and help get them into treatment.

The team will also follow up, keeping tabs on the person during recovery, offering encouragement, support and even rides to support groups.

In addition, the department will launch the Safe Passages program, in which a resident who wants to tackle his addiction can simply walk into the police sta-

tion and ask for help.

Officers will get him into a residential treatment facility, help with insurance forms and even drive him there.

Police Chief Mark Fender said it's become clear that arresting a drug addict isn't helping solve the addiction problem, so police are stepping forward, with help from the Fire Department and a coalition of Strongsville churches.

"We don't want to wait till the bottom falls out," Fender said. "We're trying to get ahead of this."

Lock Your Car Doors, Police Urge

S trongsville Police are urging residents to lock their car doors if they leave vehicles in the driveway — especially overnight.

"If you leave your doors unlocked, you're making it easy for someone to come by and grab something



from your car," Deputy Chief John Janowski said.

Also, don't leave anything of value in your vehicle, especially in plain sight. There have been several instances of purses, wallets, briefcases and laptop computers being stolen from vehicles in Strongsville this summer.

While many thieves just take items from unlocked vehicles, others will smash a window if they see something tempting inside.

"Take your valuables inside with you, and lock up," Janowski said.

Drop Off Household Hazardous Waste Sept. 6-9

The second and final Household Hazardous Waste Collection is set for Sept. 6-9 at the Strongsville Service Center, 16099 Foltz Pkwy.

Residents can drop off their household products 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sept. 6-8 and 8 a.m. to noon Saturday, Sept. 9.

Materials accepted include oil or solvent-based paint (no latex paint), varnish, mineral spirits, caustic household cleaners, adhesives, gasoline, sealers, polyurethane, herbicides, automotive fluids, roof tar, lighter fluid, primers and coatings, shellac, pesticides, motor oil, driveway sealer, mercury, paint thinner, turpentine, fungicides, car batteries and kerosene.

LATEX PAINT IS NOT ACCEPTED.

NEW RULE: Fluorescent bulbs (including curly CFLs) and rechargeable batteries are no longer accepted. Batteries + Bulbs accepts most batteries and fluorescents for recycling.
