

**SUMMARY OF CAUCUS DISCUSSION AND MINUTES OF THE STRONGSVILLE CITY COUNCIL
REGULAR MEETING HELD ON, MONDAY MAY 7, 2018.**

The Council of the City of Strongsville met in the Caucus Room at the Mike Kalinich Sr. City Council Chamber, 18688 Royalton Road, on **Monday, May 7, 2018 at 7:15 p.m.**

Council President DeMio called the caucus to order at 7:15 p.m.

The following Council Committees met to review legislation on the agenda:

Mr. Short advised Southwest General Hospital's CEO, Bill Young, will be present tonight to accept the Partner Impact Award given by Wellness 360.

Public Service and Conservation Committee: Chairwoman Roff advised Ordinance No. 2018-036 is to amend sections 1023.07 and 1228.01(h) of the Codified Ordinances concerning tree fees. This received a favorable recommendation by the Planning Commission. This will have a public hearing this evening. Pending the public hearing, the recommendation is to adopt this legislation. Ordinance No. 2018-060 is to enter into a contract for the purchase of road salt for use by the service department during the 2018-2019 season. The recommendation is to suspend and adopt that legislation. Resolution No. 2018-061 is to authorize the mayor to advertise for bids for the purchase of general pavement services for 2018-Phase II, to be used by the service department. The recommendation is to suspend and adopt this resolution.

Planning, Zoning and Engineering Committee: Chairman Schonhut advised Ordinance No. 2018-050 is an ordinance to rezone property located at the Kemper House, 10750 Prospect Road, (PPN 391-16-017) from R1-75 (One Family 75) classification to SR-1 (Senior Residence) classification. This received favorable recommendation from the Planning Commission. It will be placed on second reading and set for a public hearing on June 18, 2018. Mayor Perciak advised this rezoning will be a ballot issue. Resolution No. 2018-052 is to advertise a request for qualifications and proposals for engineering design and consulting services for the CR 188 (Howe Road) and CR 205 (Shurmer Road) roundabout project. There was a committee of the whole meeting on Tuesday, April 10th regarding this project. The recommendation is to place this on second reading. Ordinance Nos. 2018-062 and 2018-063 pertain to the rezoning of property located at Royalton Road and Webster Road. Ordinance No. 2018-062 is to change certain parts of PPNs 398-28-007, 398-28-009 and 398-28-010 from R1-75 (One Family 75) classification to either PF (Public Facilities) classification or MS (Motorist Service) classification. This ordinance will be a ballot issue. Ordinance No. 2018-063 is to change all of PPN 398-28-002 and parts of PPNs 398-28-007, 398-28-009 and 398-28-010 from either LB (Local Business) classification to PF (Public Facilities) classification, or LB (Local Business) classification to MS (Motorist Service) classification. Both will be placed on first reading and referred to Planning Commission for their recommendation. Mr. DeMio asked what was going to happen to the existing building located at Royalton Road and Webster Road. Ms. Jessica Trivisonno, an attorney for the proposed project, was present during caucus. She advised the current building that is there now will be removed and there will be a new building set farther back with green space in the frontage area.

Ms. Kosek asked about certain property ownership in this project and if it was being deeded over to The Metroparks. Ms. Trivisonno advised they are still working on the agreement with The Metroparks. The intent is for a certain portion of land to go over to The Metroparks. Mayor Perciak advised he will provide council a colored plat map to see a better visualization of the rezoning. Mr. Short asked if Ordinance No. 2016-062 fails at the ballot, what happens to the other ordinance. Mr. Jamison advised that legislation will be tabled until after Ordinance No. 2018-062 is voted on at the November Election. Resolution No. 2018-064 is to authorize the mayor to advertise for bids for the 2018 Drake Road Storm Sewer Project. The recommendation is to suspend and adopt this resolution. Suspension and adoption was also recommended for Resolution No. 2018-065. This is a resolution authorizing the mayor to advertise for bids for the 2018 Pavement Reconstruction Program-Phase II. Ms. Roff asked what the difference is between Resolution No. 2018-061 and Resolution No. 2018-065. Mayor Perciak advised one is for asphalt and the other one is for concrete.

Finance Committee: Mr. DeMio recommended suspension and adoption for Ordinance No. 2018-066. This is an appropriations ordinance for the annual expenses and other expenditures of the city for the year 2018. Mr. Dubovec advised there will be an increase in the drainage levy fund for the Drake Road sanitary sewer project and the Drake Road storm sewer repair. There is also an additional dollar amount for TMS Engineering within the TIF fund. The recommendation is to suspend and adopt this legislation.

Public Safety and Health Committee: Chairman Short advised Ordinance No. 2018-067 is a contract for the purchase of nine 2018 Ford utility interceptor vehicles and one 2018 Ford interceptor K9 vehicle for use by the police department. Mr. Short stated this is accordance to the plan at the police department to continually update and replace aging vehicles. Ford requested the city submit this contract early; the legislation for the contract to add on police equipment for these vehicles will come later. Mr. Schonhut asked what specifically will be replaced. Chief Fender stated these will be replacing cars from 2012-2014. Two of the Dodge Chargers are in excess of 72,000 miles; with a projected 15,000 more miles added before the new vehicles are ready to use. There are currently 3 K9 cars right now that are around 60,000 miles; with the idle time wearing these vehicles out. Those cars will be transitioned out completely. There was one vehicle that was totaled out (Ford Fusion). With the purchase of these SUVs, the Fusions currently being driven will be transitioned over to the detectives. Mr. Schonhut was under the impression this would be placed on first reading this evening. Mr. DeMio advised Mr. Carbone had some questions regarding this ordinance. Mr. Short advised he was not aware of that and would like to vote on this legislation tonight. Mr. Jamison advised that to get these vehicles ordered, time is of the essence. Ms. Roff asked if this money was already allocated. Mayor Perciak advised yes and it will be coming out of the vehicle fund. Chief Fender is concerned about losing the order if council waits. Mr. Short advised that if police vehicles are falling apart, he feels this should be voted on tonight. Mr. Daymut had a concern that if they waited, the transition from 2018-2019 vehicles would approach and they could lose this deal. After more discussion, it was determined to place this legislation on first reading.

Recreation and Community Services Committee: Chairman Roff recommended suspension and adoption for Ordinance No. 2018-068. This is to authorize the filing of an application through the State of Ohio Department of Natural Resources Natureworks Program for funding for a playground at Surrarrer Park, in order to assist the city in developing an outdoor public recreation area. Mr. Schonhut asked if we had already budgeted money for this. Mr. Bogre advised we had budgeted \$100,000.00; we are doing this to hopefully offset some of the cost. Mr. Bogre advised this will also be an ADA compliant playground. Suspension and adoption was recommended for Ordinance No. 2018-069 which is to submit a proposal to receive funding from the Cuyahoga County Department of Senior & Adult Services for various city senior programs, functions, and transportation for 2019. Ordinance No. 2018-070 is to enter into an agreement with the Great Lakes Baseball League for 2018 for the use of various baseball fields. Suspension and adoption was recommended for that legislation.

Suspension and adoption was also recommended for Resolution No. 2018-070; to accept a donation of \$2,000.00 to be used for the woodshop located at the senior center.

Committee of the Whole: Mr. DeMio advised Ordinance No. 2018-048 is an ordinance amending Section 1062.05 of the Codified Ordinances concerning intoxicating beverages in or on municipal property. Mr. DeMio advised the City Club is requesting for this legislation to be passed. Mr. DeMio advised they need 30 days before the event to apply for this permit for The Rib Burn-Off. In lieu of Mr. Carbone's absence, Mr. DeMio asked if council should postpone the vote until Mr. Carbone is present, either for a special meeting or for the next regular meeting. Mayor Perciak advised The City Club has done wonderful things for the city for many years. In addition, Mayor Perciak advised this is not a blanket approval for all organizations and events. This is just to make this available for a civic organization should they choose to use it. At this time, The Chamber of Commerce does not want to utilize this. This legislation was amended since the last meeting. Mr. Jamison and Mr. Goss reviewed the amendments with council. Ms. Kosek asked how many events during the summer did administration feel would qualify or possibly utilize this event during the timeframe. Mayor Perciak advised possibly three. Ms. Kosek just wanted to make sure this wasn't a routine occurrence. Ms. Roff expressed she had initial reservations about making sure events on The Commons remained family oriented. After further discussion, it was determined to vote on this legislation tonight. The recommendation was to amend, then adopt as amended. Suspension and adoption was recommended for Resolution No. 2018-072. This is to accept a donation of \$1,000.00 from Cargill Salt to be used for the Strongsville Community Garden. Mr. Walker advised Jennifer Milbrandt, our Natural Resource Coordinator contacted Cargill to obtain the donation.

Mr. Daymut asked Mr. Mikula to look at the area of Whitney Road and W. 130th Street regarding the traffic light signalization. Mr. Daymut advised he is looking for a co-sponsor for legislation to amend Section 1242.07 of the Codified Ordinances, pertaining to brewpubs and microbreweries. For years now, he has been receiving complaints about Whitney Road, in front of Lowes, pertaining to the condition of the area-grass needing cut, trash all over, trees down, etc. Mr. DeMio advised they should do legislation on behalf of all of council.

Mr. DeMio asked Mr. Biondillo for an updated report on the tennis court on Lunn Road. Mr. Biondillo stated he would look into it and provide him with an update.

Motion made by Mr. Schonhut, second by Mr. Daymut, to approve the Committee of the Whole meeting minutes of April 10, 2018. All members present voted aye and the motion carried.

MINUTES OF THE STRONGSVILLE CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING HELD ON MONDAY, May 7, 2018 IN THE MIKE KALINICH SR. CITY COUNCIL CHAMBERS.

CALL TO ORDER:

Council President DeMio called the meeting to order at 8:04 p.m. All joined in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

CERTIFICATION OF POSTING:

The Clerk of Council certified that the meeting had been posted in accordance with Ordinance No. 2004-273.

ROLL CALL:

Motion made by Mr. DeMio, second by Mr. Daymut, to excuse Councilman James E. Carbone for just cause. All members present voted aye and the motion carried.

COMMENTS ON MINUTES:

The Minutes of the Regular Council Meeting held on April 16, 2018 were approved as submitted.

APPOINTMENTS, CONFIRMATIONS, AWARDS AND RECOGNITION:

Recognition of the Partner Impact Award given by "Wellness 360" for the on-going partnership between Southwest General Hospital and the City of Strongsville.

Mayor Perciak – Thank you Mr. President, this evening we would like to recognize Southwest General Hospital for our Wellness 360 program and award here. Present with us tonight is the President of Southwest General, Bill Young. I'm going to ask Steve Kilo, our HR director, to come up with me also.

Mr. Kilo – What I want to be able to do is recognize today that...just to let everybody know that, I don't know how many people deal with health and wellness in your workplace, but it's very expansive these days and it takes more than just your organization to be able to bring about results and to get things accomplished that will have a lasting impact for your workforce. There's a group out there called Wellness 360. There's an organization where their vision is to help employers, like us, to create a culture of health for their employees while also recognizing and focusing on gaining control over healthcare costs and also promoting and providing for productivity in the workplace. What they had was a series of different awards at their most recent seminar and conference that was held in Akron a couple of weeks ago. One of their awards was a partner impact award. When they presented to me the opportunity to reach out and if we had anybody I had in mind for that type of recognition; which really, that award goes to a partner outside of your organization whose unique skills, tools, expertise, go to make a lasting impact for your organization when it comes to health and wellness. I thought no other organization than the long-standing partnership between the city and Southwest that goes back many, many decades here now, and how they've always reached out and be a community partner in so many different ways, but specifically when it comes to our employee population. They've done incredible things, whether it's in benefit design, whether it's in chronic disease management, whether it's in incentive programs for people to take care of themselves in doing things that they already have available to them through our health care plan. Not least, recently, they've jumped into the arena of going full board into wellness. Obviously, that was a way for us to partner with them as well. When I had the opportunity to express these things to their committee, there at Wellness 360, they responded very favorably and we want to now take this opportunity with the mayor up here, as our number one healthcare and health and wellness cheerleader, to present to Mr. Young at Southwest the Partner Impact Award.

APPOINTMENTS, CONFIRMATIONS, AWARDS AND RECOGNITION:

At this time, Mayor Perciak presented the award to Mr. Young, CEO of Southwest General Hospital.

(Applause)

Mr. Young – First off, I just want to thank Steve and the mayor. We've appreciated the partnership and the support that you guys have provided to us through the years. We're very honored to have this Steve, when you recognize us for the wellness we have. We got into the wellness a couple of years back and it has really taken off. I'll be honest with you, the fact that you guys embraced it so wholeheartedly has helped us as we go to other governmental agencies and businesses to say, "Look, the City of Strongsville is looking at this thing and embracing it and supporting it." That has been very, very helpful, so thank you very much for all the support that you guys have given to us. We continue to be here to serve you and make a difference for the community out there, thank you.

Mayor Perciak – I just want to add one thing. We could not provide the level of healthcare for our employees and their families without the cooperation of Southwest General. So much of that Bill is attributable to you and your staff; so thank you very much. All of our employees and their families thank you.

Mr. DeMio – I just want it noted that I think Mr. Kilo will pay a very dear price for calling the mayor a cheerleader. We'll see next week how that will come out.

Mayor Perciak – No comment.

PUBLIC HEARING:

Ordinance No. 2018-036 by Mayor Perciak and Ms. Roff. AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 1023.07 OF TITLE TWO OF PART TEN-STREETS, UTILITIES AND PUBLIC SERVICES CODE; AND SECTION 1228.01(h) OF TITLE FOUR OF PART TWELVE-PLANNING AND ZONING CODE, OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF STRONGSVILLE, CONCERNING TREE FEES. *First reading and referred to Planning Commission 03-19-18. *Council President DeMio opened the Public Hearing on this matter and invited anyone wishing to speak **IN FAVOR** of the Ordinance to approach the podium and address Council at this time.*

Hearing no further comments in regard to this matter, Council President DeMio closed the Public Hearing on said Ordinance.

REPORTS OF COUNCIL COMMITTEES:

SCHOOL BOARD – Mr. Carbone:

Mr. DeMio – I will do a brief summary; Jim will have a more up-to-date summary when he comes back at the next council meeting. Really quick, we had our first joint meeting with the school board and the superintendent and other authorities in the school board administration. They shared with us their experiences and hills and valleys of the budget process with us. They shared with us what their possible plans are in the future. They had quite an intense amount of information for us. I thought it was terrific. All of council showed up, all of the school board showed up, and we were able to see Ms. Ludwig an extra time in the month and we love that. She's their representative to our council meetings. The mayor had some nice overview. All the councilmen that were attending, which was everybody, had some good questions. Some listened and took copious notes. With that said, our law director enjoyed coming to that meeting. He thought it was a well done and well prepared meeting. Is there anybody that wants to say anything about school board at all?

Mr. Schonhut – I enjoyed the meeting. I certainly appreciated taking the time and hope that we can do that again in the future sometime soon; keep the communication open and next time we'll have it at our house.

Mr. DeMio – We'll have it here, that's correct.

SOUTHWEST GENERAL HEALTH SYSTEM – Mr. Short: Thank you Mr. DeMio, no report tonight. I would like to congratulate Mr. Young on the Wellness 360 award and also to say the Tiara Ball, which was last month, did gross over \$350,000.00 for the hospital system. That was a big success. I'm happy to take any questions; that concludes my report.

BUILDING AND UTILITIES – Mr. Daymut: Thank you Mr. DeMio, we have no ordinances or resolutions on this evening's agenda. I would happily answer any questions anyone would have.

COMMUNICATIONS AND TECHNOLOGY – Ms. Kosek: We have no ordinances or resolutions on the agenda. That completes my report. If anybody has questions, I would be happy to take them.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT – Mr. Daymut: Thank you Mr. DeMio, we have no ordinances or resolutions on this evening's agenda. I'm going to give a brief report on our meeting of Monday, April 23rd. We did discuss our breakfast meeting for May 3rd. I would like to report it was very successful. I would like to thank Key Bank for sponsoring that particular breakfast meeting. A special thanks to Bruce McCain. He's the Chief Investment Strategist for Key Bank and he gave an economic overview. I found it very interesting and very informative. I think he has a good handle on what's going on. For me personally, I can tell you that when he was talking about the retired people-that 90% are not funded, I hope I was in the 10% that were funded. I did take that away from the meeting. We did receive a report from our tech committee, Ed Oliveros. He gave us some information on NASA and some other jobs and interests in some of the other things that we may be involved with there. We also...he brought up the fact that maybe at our next breakfast in September we may have NASA come in. You know they have a great partnership with some of our businesses here in the City of Strongsville and they have a lot of offerings that nobody is really aware of in my opinion. We discussed Ordinance Nos. 2018-049 and 2018-050. We talked about SouthPark Mall and Sears-the fact that they are in the process of selling the building, but still want to maintain a footprint. We're going to follow up on that. We understand that by the end of May there will be some decision made on that. We did discuss security and the focus with cameras in the parking lot. We did receive a report from Brent Painter. He was able to attend a meeting at Cleveland State University. They have become very active in strengthening established communities' data project tools that they will be providing to us. It's a GSI system/database. They are going to roll that out, hopefully, by November.

REPORTS OF COUNCIL COMMITTEES (cont'd):

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT – Mr. Daymut (cont'd): As soon as we get more information, I'll have that. We had a Strongsville business update. Our next meeting will be Tuesday, May 29th at 7:00 p.m. at the Strongsville Recreation & Senior Center. That's all I have this evening, thank you Mr. DeMio.

FINANCE – Mr. Carbone:

Mr. DeMio – There is an ordinance, Ordinance No. 2018-066. It's for annual expenses as well as to repeal Ordinance No. 2018-042. We're going to suspend and adopt that tonight. I don't think that the finance director needs to say anything more than, unless he wants to have any input? It's just a process that we do throughout the year.

Mr. Dubovec – Everything is in order.

Mr. DeMio – That's what we like to hear from the money man. I will take questions for Jim and take notes if anyone has any questions?

PLANNING, ZONING AND ENGINEERING – Mr. Schonhut: Thank you Mr. DeMio, a few ordinances and resolutions tonight. Ordinance No. 2018-050. This is the Kemper House rezoning on Prospect Road. It did receive favorable recommendation from Planning Commission. This is going to be set for a public hearing on June 18th. This will ultimately have to go to the vote of the people on the ballot. Resolution No. 2018-052, this is a resolution authorizing the mayor to request for qualifications and proposals for the roundabout at Howe Road and Shurmer Road. We're going to place that on second reading tonight. Ordinance No. 2018-062 and 2018-063, both kind of go together. This is for rezoning over on Roylton Road and Webster Road. One of these will have to go to a vote of the people as well; and we will table the other one eventually when that does happen. For now, we're going to put both on first reading and refer over to the Planning Commission. We have Resolution No. 2018-064. This is authorizing the mayor to advertise for bids for the 2018 Drake Road Storm Sewer Project in the City of Strongsville. Mr. Hasko, since I see you are joining us here tonight, that is near your home. I know three weeks ago the mayor promised that he would get that on the agenda here for you tonight and he got it done. Hopefully we'll get that moving. We're getting bids first then hopefully get that done for you here so everything is taken care of. I ask that we suspend and adopt that tonight please. Resolution No. 2018-065 is to advertise for bids for the 2018 Pavement Reconstruction Program, Phase II. This is for concrete and I ask that we suspend and adopt that tonight as well. That I believe is all I have Mr. DeMio unless anybody has any questions.

PUBLIC SAFETY AND HEALTH – Mr. Short: Thank you Mr. DeMio, we have one ordinance tonight, Ordinance No. 2018-067 which is for the replacement of 10 police vehicles with 9-2018 Ford interceptor utility vehicles and 1 Ford interceptor vehicle that will be a K9 vehicle. Due to some questions with some members of council, we are going to place that on first reading tonight. That's all I have for my committee but I will happily take any questions.

REPORTS OF COUNCIL COMMITTEES (cont'd):

PUBLIC SERVICE AND CONSERVATION – Ms. Roff: We have an ordinance that the mayor talked about. This we will adopt tonight. It's on the third reading; it came back with a favorable recommendation. This is Ordinance No. 2018-036; and this is to increase the tree fees for replacement or new for the city. I recommend adopt for that. I have Ordinance No. 2018-060 and this is an ordinance to enter into a contract with ODOT to give them, to go into partnership with them, to bid for salt for next winter's season. That will be suspend and adopt. Resolution No. 2018-061 falls into the same-Phase II that Matt just talked about. This will be for general pavement services for the 2018 Phase II going out for bids. Should I just roll into...?

Mr. DeMio – Sure.

Ms. Roff – I have Ordinance No. 2018-068. This is to put in an application for funding to receive funds for...and there's already some money budgeted for that too, for playground equipment at Surrarer Park. The recommendation is to suspend and adopt. Bryan had mentioned in caucus that it is ADA accessible...lots of great things that he talked about in there. The recommendation is to suspend and adopt. This is Ordinance No. 2018-069 and this is for Bryan to go out and to put a proposal together to receive funding from Cuyahoga County Department of Senior and Adult Services for their programs for transportation, etc. That's suspend and adopt. Ordinance No. 2018-070, this is an ordinance allowing the mayor to go into contract with Great Lakes Baseball League on a limited basis for the 2018 season. That's recommended to suspend and adopt. Then I have Resolution No. 2018-071 and this is another donation from an extremely generous man who has donated before and he is donating another \$2,000.00 to the woodshop over at the rec center; that's suspend and adopt. Resolution No. 2018-072 is to accept another donation for...actually, this is for the community garden up over by the Southwest building. That is for \$1,000.00 and that is all that I have...and that's recommended suspend and adopt.

Mr. Schonhut – Mr. DeMio, if I could; although we didn't always necessarily see eye to eye, and I think that's well documented, but credit where credit is due on the Surrarer Park. I know Duke Southworth worked a lot with Bryan on getting that to become a reality and I want to make sure that Duke, although he's no longer up here with us, is given credit for a lot of that. I know Bryan continues to work to save us any money that he can in that respect too. I'm sure the people on that end of town are looking forward to whatever Bryan has envisioned becoming a reality up there in the near future here.

Mr. DeMio – Yes, and if you go back in a little more history, Mike Daymut...

Mr. Schonhut – And Mike, I'm sorry.

Mr. DeMio - ...started the ball rolling. If I recall, Kelly Kosek brought it up at a debate.

Ms. Kosek – Frequently.

Mr. DeMio – There you go...the whole gamut here so with that Ann, can we close the committees?

Ms. Roff – We can close the committees.

RECREATION AND COMMUNITY SERVICES – Ms. Roff:

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE – Mr. DeMio: Ann put the last resolution on the page in there. The other one, Ordinance No. 2018-048 is the ordinance that we've been working through over the last several months. Neal Jamison put together an ordinance to allow, for lack of a better term, beer and wine at our Commons. The City Club is the one that has requested to do that. We've had back and forth for the last couple of years or so. It's on before us to vote tonight. That's the only other thing. I do want to make a little extra note that Pat Stewart's, former assistant clerk of council, husband passed away-Art. When I was there, I'm sure others had attended, she was so very grateful that this council, this administration, remembered her. I have to tell you something, she really, if you know her well, she really meant that. She was really taken back that several of us showed up and we took the time. Aimee took the time to make sure there was a beautiful bouquet from this council and she wrote a very nice letter...if not all of us individually, council as well as a group. Mayor, I don't want to take any of your steam on that but she certainly thanked you very much as well. I want to note that for the record because she was so very special to all of us and still is. Her husband was awesome if you knew Art. I'm going to close that portion.

REPORTS AND COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR, DIRECTORS OF DEPARTMENTS AND OTHER OFFICERS:

MAYOR PERCIAK: Thank you Mr. President, just a few items of note. Tomorrow is Election Day. The polls open at 6:30 a.m. and close at 7:30 p.m. It's a Primary Election in the State of Ohio. It's a primary election for all of our statewide offices and federal offices. Please take time to go and vote tomorrow. Secondly, again on Wednesday afternoon at 4:00 p.m. I will be downtown at the county. I serve on their charter review committee and there will be another public meeting at 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday. On May 15th I will be in Columbus all day meeting with several of our state legislators for a variety of subjects; so don't look for me around here, I'll be there. It's important and I'll be going with several of my fellow mayors from surrounding communities on issues that pertain to our community. We look forward to a healthy discussion with everybody there in Columbus. Sunday is Mother's Day and to all of our mothers, I want to wish them a Happy Mother's Day. To our wives, to our grandmothers, to our godmothers and to those of us whose mothers have passed away, please remember them in a special way. That ends my report.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT – Mr. Dubovec: Thank you Mr. President, funds will be made available for all ordinances and resolutions on this evening's agenda requiring certification of funding and that concludes my report, thank you.

LAW DEPARTMENT – Mr. Jamison: All resolutions and ordinances are in proper legal form.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION:

Mr. DeMio – Mr. Hasko, you are up first. Please, I know you know the drill here, try to keep it under five minutes. Spell your first and last name and give your address as well.

John Hasko, 14515 Drake Road, Strongsville, OH: John Hasko, 14515 Drake Road. Mayor, when you go down on the 15th, are you going to be talking to all these people down there? When you go with the other mayors?

Mayor Perciak – Yes.

Mr. Hasko – Get after them about what NOACA can do for us along I-71...all the mayors.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION (cont'd):

Mayor Perciak – Well, believe me, we have a long agenda but the city engineers and myself are constantly meeting with NOACA. Believe me, we express your views and more.

Mr. Hasko – Did you read the article in the paper about NOACA, what they're doing? They are projecting what they are going to do for 2045. What about today? What about what we need right now?

Mayor Perciak – I'm not arguing with you, you're right.

Mr. Hasko – Mr. Schonhut, on the roundabout...

Mr. Schonhut – Yes sir.

Mr. Hasko – This resolution that we have here right now, is that costing the city anything?

Mr. Schonhut – The one that's on the table right now? No.

Mr. Hasko – Okay, good.

Mr. Schonhut – That's to get qualifications and proposals. If we were to approve, the next one after that would be where we would start spending money, if any, on engineering services; but, the one that is before us right now does not involve any dollars.

Mr. Hasko – All right, I'd like to make a suggestion that before any of that happens, you and engineering and anybody else that's involved in this learn everything you possibly can about what different ways it can be done...not necessarily right now any estimates of how it's going to go, but what you can learn. Then send out those little mail flyers to everybody's houses right in that general area as to what you want to do, what you're thinking of and that you're going to have a big huge meeting at the recreation center to discuss what you are looking at-this way, that way, what would happen, how it works...everything. You must have a big, open meeting at the recreation center before the city spends a dime.

Mr. Schonhut – Mr. Hasko, as you know, when the slip ramp was going on and me and you talked what felt like daily during that time, we talked quite often as I'm sure your remember. I know you know that at that time I did my homework and took the time to read a lot about what was going on there. I promise to do the same here. I will say now with what we have right now, we don't necessarily have all the answers and some of this would potentially answer some of that. I'm not saying it's the best or the worst thing in the world either way, but...

Mr. Hasko – I just want you to remember this. I'm telling you right now a roundabout is the wrong way to go because people here, anywhere, Strongsville, Brunswick, Cleveland, etc., if you're thinking everybody is all normal, courteous, kind, they're going to stop, etc.-I just want to ask you one thing.

Mr. Schonhut – Yes.

Mr. Hasko – You said that to put the roundabout in is a million dollars...approximately. This is approximate.

Mr. Schonhut – Well, not my number but...

Mr. DeMio – John, wait a second, for the record, Matt didn't say that.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION (cont'd):

Mr. Schonhut – That's not my number.

Mr. DeMio – Who said that?

Mr. Hasko - ...an engineer wrote it down...it was just an approximation. But then they said an approximation for \$1.7 million they could put in a right hand turning, left hand turn lanes, a little go around extra, all to keep the traffic light there. They said \$100,000.00 more. Just give me this, yes or no, how would like (unintelligible) NOACA is out there, they have all kinds of money. They were going to help with the other things, the slip ramp.

Mayor Perciak – No they weren't.

Mr. Hasko – They are looking at how to help alleviate traffic. We have to get after them to help with that, go with the higher amount of money, do it the right way, not the wrong way. What would happen if your mother was going around that stupid thing and she got broadsided and killed? How would you feel about that \$700,000.00?

Mr. Schonhut – I think we know how everybody in this room would feel. God forbid that anything would happen to anybody.

Mr. Hasko – Mark my words, I'm on the record, somebody will get killed if you put that roundabout in. Somebody will get killed.

Mr. DeMio – Thank you so much John, I appreciate it. John Piter, could you please come up, spell your first and last name and give me your address too.

John Piter, 15630 Indianhead Lane, Strongsville, OH: John Piter, 15630 Indianhead Lane. My name is spelled J-O-H-N, P-I-T-E-R. I'm here to talk tonight about the roundabout or traffic circle is what it is. Traffic circles, number one, are dangerous; anybody should know that. Talk to any other community about it. The intersection of Howe and Shurmer has a three-way signal and the police department would probably tell you how many accidents have been there. Being I have lived here for 36 years, I haven't heard of too many accidents. The traffic flows through there pretty good, except at rush hour. Maybe the light could be timed a little different for Howe Road/more traffic to go through, but a roundabout or a traffic circle is not a good idea. I'd hate to see us spend money even to do the study because I think it's pretty simple, just talk to the police department. Talk to the police departments that have other traffic circles and they're failures. I lived in Europe for a while, traffic circles are a joke. I mean it's a mess. As John was saying, inconsiderate people going into a traffic circle...they don't know what to do or they don't care. My recommendation is don't spend any money for even a study of a traffic circle. I think it's pretty simple, just ask other police departments, thank you.

Mr. DeMio – Thank you, Sara, come on up please. Spell your first and last name and address please.

Sara Marxen, 20624 Albion Road, Strongsville, OH: Hi, my name is Sara, S-A-R-A, no H, Marxen, M-A-R-X-E-N, also no H. I live at 20624 Albion Road and I would like to give some comments on Ordinance No. 2018-048 that would permit limited alcohol service at summertime events on The Commons. While I am concerned that the city's family events can be turned into drunken parties, it is more concerning to me that this ordinance is labeled as an emergency.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION (cont'd):

Ms. Marxen (cont'd) - Section 3 of the proposed ordinance states that, and I quote, "This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure immediately necessary for the preservation of public peace, health, safety, and welfare of the city and for the further reason that it is immediately necessary to update the city's codified ordinances concerning alcoholic beverages on municipal property." I would argue and would put a wager that many healthcare providers would agree that the need for an immediately necessary update to the Codified Ordinances to allow for alcohol to be served is the exact opposite of preservation public health, peace, safety and welfare for the city. I'm not familiar with an alcohol emergency in the sense that someone needs to get alcohol into their system, but I have seen my fair share of people who need to get alcohol out of their system. My understanding of why this is an emergency is that the Rib Cook-Off is coming soon and they would like to serve alcohol. There was the entire fall, winter and spring to get this ordinance passed, and now here we are at the 11th hour calling this an emergency. Emergency or not, I have other concerns. This city has a responsibility to ensure the health and safety of all guests on The Commons. I'm curious about what steps the city plans to do this. I'm not familiar enough with alcohol permitting or this proposed legislation to know things like whether increased law enforcement will be required, how the organizers of each event will control and monitor for underage drinking, when the volunteers will be required to stop serving, if the volunteers are actually serving or there are professional bartenders, whether free rides home will be provided, whether there will be restrictions on serving sizes, whether the organizational or the city will be responsible for the additional cleanup of cups and the inevitable vomit around the green space, what training the volunteers are required to undergo before serving alcohol, whether there will be a sobriety checkpoint nearby, etc. There's also nothing I see in the ordinance that limits this to weekend events only, so could a group that meets the organizational and permitting requirements host an event on a Tuesday night? Could the entire summer be filled with wine night after wine night after wine night on The Commons? People will be driving after this event, after any event where they are serving alcohol near a pretty busy intersection...and they'll probably go to the roundabout. Why I would like to think that most people are responsible consumers, there are those that are not. Let's not encourage more at the city's family-friendly events like the Rib Cook-Off and Homecoming. There are 3+ places that I could through a rock to from The Commons and go get a drink. Support the local businesses that are here, thank you.

Mr. DeMio – I just want to note that Sara was in the caucus room with us. I know Mr. Jamison went over some hosted issues so he could highlight that. When I first got on council, I always wondered why does everything have to be an emergency. What does that mean? So if you could start anyway you feel like.

Mr. Jamison – Sure, just to address a couple of things raised by the resident. First of all, through the enactment of the amendment of this ordinance, the safety director is going to have certain abilities to develop and enforce rules as it relates to events that take place on the square. As he looks at the particular event that will be coming in, it could be the number of off-duty officers who would have to work in terms of security, the hours of restriction, ages of admission, etc. Things of that nature could go into the rules or for the permit being issued. On top of it, this is limited to non-profit corporations or associations that have very limited...for a purpose for educational, fraternal, things of that nature. It's not just that anybody could walk in and get the permit to do this. It's going to be a window that allows civic groups in our community to come and take advantage if they so desire to use the square for that purpose. Actually, by doing this ordinance, it does fulfill the health and safety requirements because it's giving the safety director and the city the ability to do things to ensure that safety is provided during that event. As it relates to the emergency, people always get-I don't want to say confused, but it really goes to when it goes into effect. If it gets the required votes, it goes into effect immediately. Everybody thinks, "Why is everything an emergency?" It really gets down to when the legislation starts or takes effect. In this case, the intent was that when this was adopted that the ordinance would go into effect right away.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION (cont'd):

Mr. Jamison (cont'd) - In my opinion, after listening to council and talking to the various members of our safety forces, we felt that what we've come up here with, these amendments, will properly address the safety concerns and provide a safe and good environment for anyone who might hold an event on the square where they choose to try and do this. Credit to council for their input in terms of providing guidance to me to make these changes. I think this is something that will actually help improve safety during these events. Thank you Mr. Chairman.

Mr. Schonhut – Joe, if I could just add on to that. I think it's important to note that we did amend it to make it stricter, or give Safety Director Goss more power in that respect too. We did read this a couple of times as the ordinance was originally presented which was a little bit broader. Today is definitely not the first day that it is in front of us...

Mr. DeMio – In fact Matt, this has been going on for several years. Even though the readings weren't there, this is a discussion that's happened. Mayor, correct me if I'm wrong...

Mayor Perciak – No, you're correct Joe.

Mr. DeMio - ...several years because we had to make sure...there are so many things you have to make sure when you do this type of a change. They've reached out to this city, and it's only the City Club I might add, not the Chamber of Commerce, not the Women's League, not the Arts in Strongsville, not any of that.

Mr. Schonhut – Sara, obviously Sara with no H-I like that, obviously many of the concerns that you brought up were valid and a lot of those were discussed three weeks ago in depth at our council meeting and I think that's why we amended everything here tonight-that what's in front of us now, that Neal did the best that he could to try to corral a lot of the concern that you had were a lot of the same concerns that a lot of us brought up at our meeting three weeks ago. I know there's something you're dying to say so go ahead.

Ms. Marxen – I can appreciate the fact that you think it's health and safety but you don't have to serve alcohol. I want to just get on the record and say I don't think city events on The Commons should serve alcohol. Maybe that got overlooked earlier. When you have families with children at events you should not serve alcohol. Right now, sure it's only the City Club that wants it. It is open to everybody who meets those criteria is my understanding.

Mr. DeMio – You're 100% correct.

Ms. Marxen – No alcohol.

Mr. DeMio – Is there anyone else that would like to...well, she didn't finish her five minutes.

Mr. Piter – I'm no do-gooder but promoting alcohol on The Commons is a bad idea. I was a secretary of a veterans club for many years, non-profit organization, the whole works. You guys know, that's conducive to drinking. To promote it on our Commons is a bad idea, and I'm no do-gooder, believe me.

Mr. DeMio – Okay, is there anyone else that hasn't come up to the podium and would like to speak?
