

**SUMMARY OF CAUCUS DISCUSSION AND MINUTES OF THE STRONGSVILLE CITY COUNCIL  
REGULAR MEETING HELD ON, MONDAY, FEBRUARY 7, 2022.**

The Council of the City of Strongsville met in the Caucus Room at the Mike Kalinich Sr. City Council Chamber, 18688 Royalton Road, on **Monday, February 7, 2022 at 7:30 p.m.**

Council President Jim Carbone called the caucus to order at 7:30 p.m.

Planning, Zoning and Engineering Committee: Mr. Carbone recommended suspension and adoption for Ordinance No. 2022-010; an ordinance to enter into an agreement with ODOT to provide funding in connection with the Whitney Road covered bridge project. Funding will be up to a maximum of \$581,439.00, for a total project cost of \$901,300.00. Suspension and adoption was also recommended for Resolution No. 2022-011; a resolution confirming Planning Commission's approval of a site plan for a rehabilitation facility located at 19156 Pearl Road.

Public Service & Conservation Committee: Chairman DeMio recommended suspension and adoption for Ordinance No. 2022-011; a change order for an extension of the contract completion date with Great Lakes Construction Co. in connection with the screenings and blower improvements at wastewater treatment plants B and C. The new completion date will be June 14, 2022 instead of March 1, 2022. Suspension and adoption was recommended for Ordinance No. 2022-013; a change order for an increase in the contract price with Great Lakes Construction Co. in connection with the screenings and blower improvements at wastewater treatment plants B and C. The increase is in the amount of \$7,438.13, for a total project cost of \$1,042,438.13. Suspension and adoption was recommended for Ordinance No. 2022-014; authorizing the filing of an application for financial assistance with the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District under the 2022 community recycling awareness grant program to receive funding to help with the city's recycling program. This is for the flyer Ms. Milbrandt sends out to residents regarding our recycling program. Resolution No. 2022-015 is to grant permission to transfer certain certificates for burial rights in the Strongsville Municipal Cemetery [Samad]. Suspension and adoption was recommended for that legislation. Suspension and adoption was recommended for Ordinance No. 2022-016; a contract with Cleveland Freightliner, Inc., dba: Valley Freightliner Sterling & Wester Star, Inc. for the purchase of 2 Wester Star 4700SB front axle cab and chassis units for use by the service department. The contract is in an amount not to exceed \$220,916.00. Ordinance No. 2022-017 is a contract with Concord Road Equipment Mfg., Inc. to purchase 2 stainless steel combination dump body spreaders and related snow and ice control equipment packages for use by the service department. This is the equipment that will go on the vehicles purchased in Ordinance No. 2022-016. The recommendation was to suspend and adopt that legislation. Mr. Jamison advised these vehicles will not be available and in use till next year due to delays in the supply chain. Mr. DeMio asked Mr. Jamison to discuss with Mr. Sems more ways to send out notifications to the public regarding the city's safety information. For example, during the

snowstorm, there was not a lot of communication to the residents about the delay/postponement of trash pickup. Mr. Short advised the intersection of Pearl Road/Drake Road, and areas of Prospect Road, are very torn up due to the snowstorm. Mr. Jamison advised they did discuss that at the staff meeting today and there were service crews out laying cold patch down. In addition, the crews are working to remove accumulated snow piles to increase driver visibility at various intersections.

Recreation & Community Services Committee: Chairwoman Roff recommended suspension and adoption for Ordinance No. 2022-018; an ordinance to accept funding from ODNR for renovations to the aquatic center pool at the recreation and senior center. The funding is in the amount of \$150,000.00. Ms. Roff questioned a provision in the contract regarding use of the facility. Mr. Jamison advised that in order to accept the funding, there is an agreement that for 15 years the city cannot change the use of the recreation center. This is for ODNR to ensure the monies being allocated for the project aren't being wasted because the city would turn around and sell the building. Ordinance No. 2022-019 is to authorize a contract for the purchase of youth sports wearing apparel for use by the recreation department. The contract is with Team Adler Sports in the amount not to exceed \$34,887.48. Suspension and adoption was recommended for that legislation. Suspension and adoption was recommended for Ordinance No. 2022-020; a grant with NOPEC, Inc. to utilize energy efficient building materials and/or for energy infrastructure projects in connection with the Town Center enhancement & walkability initiative. The funding is in the amount of \$114,144.00. Resolution No. 2022-021 is to accept a donation from the Spinoso Management Group, LLC to be used in connection with the Strongsville Town Center enhancement & walkability initiative. The grant is in the amount of \$10,000.00. Suspension and adoption was recommended for that legislation. Suspension and adoption was recommended for Resolution No. 2022-022; a donation from the Strongsville Community Theater, in the amount of \$2,000.00, in appreciation of the staff and personnel at the recreation and senior center.

Building & Utilities Committee: Chairman Clark recommended suspension and adoption for Ordinance No. 2022-023; an ordinance to dispose of filing cabinets no longer needed by the building department.

Public Safety & Health Committee: Mr. Carbone recommended suspension and adoption for Ordinance No. 2022-024; a contract to purchase Six 2022 Ford interceptor SUV's for use by the police department. The contract is with Montrose Ford, Inc. in the amount of \$234,881.70. Suspension and adoption was recommended for Resolution No. 2022-025; a resolution to purchase a portable drug disposal incinerator system through funds available in the law enforcement federal contraband seizure fund.

**COMMENTS ON MINUTES:**

The Minutes of the Regular Council Meeting held on January 18, 2022 were approved as submitted. The Minutes of the Special Council Meetings held on January 12, 2022 were approved as submitted.

**APPOINTMENTS, CONFIRMATIONS, AWARDS AND RECOGNITIONS:**

**Mayor's appointment and Council confirmation of Michael J. Polo III to a four (4) year term as a member of the City's Planning Commission, effective January 19, 2022 and expiring January 18, 2026.**

***Motion made by Ms. Kosek, second by Mr. DeMio, to appoint Michael J. Pollo III to a four (4) year term as a member of the City's Planning Commission, effective, January 19, 2022 and expiring January 18, 2026. All members present voted aye and the motion carried.***

**REPORTS OF COUNCIL COMMITTEES:**

**SCHOOL BOARD – Mr. Clark:** The school board meeting was most recently on January 27th. During the January board meeting was board recognition month and Superintendent, Dr. Ryba, recognized the board: Michelle Bissell, Richard Micko, Laura Wolfe-Housum, Sharon Kilbane and Hayley Stovcik for all they've done for Strongsville City Schools and all they will continue to do for our students. Athletic Director, Denny Ziegler, recognized two students, soccer players, that represented Strongsville nationally; participating in the "Top Drawer Soccer All-American game." He went on to recognize them for being role model students and their participation in Strongsville High School's city council. Strongsville PTA recognized George Anagnostou, treasurer of Strongsville City Schools, surprising him with his nomination for the "Founders Award" for his outstanding service to children and students in our district. Mark your calendars, March 3<sup>rd</sup> is Founder's Day, I believe, at the middle school. During the treasurer's report by previously recognized George Anagnostou, the financial report-they closed out November and December; and trending through December 31<sup>st</sup>, compared to the 5-year forecast, everything was favorable. Once again, the State of Ohio conducts an audit. The school was audited as they always are and it was a result of "unmodified status;" which means that they had a very successful audit. This month in February, the auditor from the state will come recognize them with an award for distinction.

**REPORTS OF COUNCIL COMMITTEES (Cont'd):**

**SCHOOL BOARD – Mr. Clark (cont'd):** I think it's the third time that the schools have received that award. The school calendars were approved for both the 2022/2023 and 2023/2024 school years. There were no changes to what had been previously shared with the community. This concludes my report from the January 27<sup>th</sup> school board meeting.

Mr. Short – Just for the record, Mr. Micko, the President of the school board is here. Thank you, Mr. Micko, for now 10 years of service in the school board. We thank you for all that you do for the school board.

Ms. Roff – If you don't mind if I could add Tom, the Boosters are having one of their big fund raisers, "Night at the Races," February 19<sup>th</sup>. If you want to get out and have some fun, it is at Michauds. You can buy horses, donate baskets...all kinds of fun stuff.

Mr. Clark – Tickets can be bought online at [Strongsvilleathleticboosters.org](http://Strongsvilleathleticboosters.org). If there are still horses available, I would move quickly to secure a horse, hopefully a winning one.

Mr. Short – Ann, and you have a table for Council, is that correct?

Ms. Roff – I do not at this time, but I am going to sit at your table. Yes, you can buy tables. It is a fun event. I actually was...something that I was on the first annual as a co-chair. It is a huge success.

**BUILDING AND UTILITIES – Mr. Clark:** One piece of legislation tonight, which is going to be Ordinance No. 2022-2023. The recommendation is going to be suspend and adopt. That's an ordinance authorizing the disposal of old filing cabinets utilized by the building department. As we heard earlier during caucus, it supports our efforts to digitize the department. These are obsolete and no longer needed. The recommendation again is to suspend and adopt.

Mr. Carbone – Any questions for Mr. Clark?

**SOUTHWEST GENERAL HEALTH SYSTEM – Mr. Short:** Thank you Mr. Carbone, an update from the Southwest President and CEO, Bill Young. This is through January 31, 2022. They have tested more than 53,000 people and treated more than 7,900 confirmed cases of COVID at the hospital. As of that date, 37 patient deaths due to COVID-19; however, the number of people being hospitalized with COVID-19 has decreased steadily over January, with the month ending average of only 20 patients inhouse per day. The positivity rate continues to decline as well; it has now decreased to 11%; so I think the trends we are seeing across the country we are seeing here at the health system. The national guard was onsite and deployed for the surge with the Omicron variant; however, their last day at Southwest General was on Friday, January 28<sup>th</sup>. The system has resumed performing elective surgeries and procedures that require overnight hospital stays. For now, the system is continuing to test though at the hospital system if you need to; and hopefully continue to see that trending downward on the COVID-19 numbers in our area. That concludes my Southwest report, but I'll happily take any questions.

**ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT – Mr. Short:** We have not met yet. I am meeting with our Economic Development Director, Brent Painter, this week to discuss an agenda for the upcoming meeting scheduled for late February. I may have a work conflict and may have to move that date; but I will report on that at the next meeting.

Mr. Carbone – Thank you Mr. Short.

**REPORTS OF COUNCIL COMMITTEES (cont'd):**

**PUBLIC SERVICE AND CONSERVATION – Mr. DeMio:** Thank you so much, so this committee has ordinances and resolutions from 2022-012 through 2022-017, with a variety of things for the wastewater treatment plant, to parts we need for trucks...so on and so forth. As our law director stated, they're purchasing things now because it's so hard to get them for the trucks we have...a year out; so that's great vision. We have the money; we're blessed to have the money to do things such as that. We are continually updating the wastewater treatment plant to make sure things are going smoothly; but when you do updates, you find new things; and we do have some upgrades there. One knows that we never want to stop the flow of the wastewater treatment plant to make sure everything goes properly and it works well. I thank everybody for their support. I'm not going to go into each individual ordinances or resolutions; I just want to say that everything is suspension and adoption. Neal, really quick, thank you for all your help during this crazy weather; and share that with a sincere, kind of an acting mayor...can you share that with the service department...all those who helped...and our police and fire, ems? They did a fabulous job this weekend. I do have to say, today we had a pretty interesting car on fire on the I-71 ramp, right on I-71 and S.R. 82, as some of us were heading downtown; and boy did they do a good job by blocking off I-71, getting all of the trucks in a safe area, walking people a far enough distance away that couldn't stay in their cars. You're at the light, things are frozen so they can do their work. I just want to say that was something that I happened to bump into; but it was so well done. It really didn't affect the traffic. It was quite amazing.

Mr. Jamison – I'll let him know.

Mr. DeMio – Tip the cap to everybody involved there please.

Mr. Jamison – Especially service, this past week, worked almost around the clock to ensure that people could move appropriately. They did a super job staying ahead of it and credit to them; as well as police and fire for doing what they do as well; but I'll let them know.

Mr. DeMio – Thank you so much, but I'll field questions from any council member.

Ms. Kosek – I don't have any questions, but I just wanted to add the thanks to the service department. In addition to them dealing with keeping the roads clear; I know that because the snow was so heavy, there were lots of mailboxes that were knocked down and they were right out there. People were very happy to have their mailboxes up quickly; and so appreciate them continuing to just do the best service for our community. That's all, sorry.

Mr. DeMio – No...and it's so funny, being on Council for a while, there was a time that they wouldn't do anything till spring; and they would have to work around it...get a stop at the post office over on Pearl Road and they'd have to live with what goes on. Now, they put up a temporary if they can't put up a full thing; it's quite amazing how it's changed.

Mr. Clark – We're all very fortunate to have our service department.

Mr. DeMio – Yes, we're lucky to have the tax dollars in which to do it; we really are.

Mr. Short – Yes, and Neal, pass along from all of Council that we appreciate everything they did this past week with the snow.

**FINANCE – Ms. Kosek:** We have no ordinances or resolutions on tonight's agenda; but if anybody has any questions, I would probably make you talk to our finance director, Mr. Deans; but if you have any questions for me, I'd be happy to take those also.

Mr. Carbone – We have Ordinance No. 2022-010. This is authorizing the Mayor to enter into an LPA Federal local let project agreement, with the Ohio Department of Transportation, to provide funding in connection with the Whitney Road covered bridge project. This is funding up to \$581,439.00. the total amount for the project is \$901,300.00. the recommendation is to suspend and adopt. We have Resolution No. 2022-011, confirming Planning Commission approval of a site plan for Encompass Health, a rehabilitation center, located at 19156 Pearl Road. The recommendation is to suspend and adopt.

**PUBLIC SAFETY AND HEALTH – Mr. Kaminski:**

Mr. Carbone – we have Ordinance No. 2022-024. This is requesting participation in the Ohio Department of administrative services contracts to purchase six 2022 Ford interceptor sport utility police vehicles by our police department. The total cost is \$234,881.70. this is an agreement with Montrose Ford. This funding will be coming out of the emergency vehicle fund. Lastly, we have Resolution No. 2022-025. This is a resolution authorizing the police department to purchase a portable drug disposal incinerator system through funds available from our law enforcement federal contraband seizure fund. The recommendation here is to suspend and adopt. Is there any questions on any of those?

**RECREATION AND COMMUNITY SERVICES – Ms. Roff:** I have Ordinance No. 2022-018; and that is to accept funding from ODNR in the amount of \$150,000.00 to put towards the aquatic center at the rec center. The recommendation there is suspend and adopt. I have Ordinance 2022-019 and that is an ordinance for all of our softball and baseball uniforms. It is the same company that we have been using. The recommendation there is suspend and adopt. I have Ordinance No. 2022-020; and this is to accept an agreement with NOPEC for grant money in the amount of a little under \$115,000.00. That will go towards the center of town plan for the splash pad and all those other things that we put out a couple of months ago. Also, I have Resolution No. 2022-021; and that is to accept money from...this is SouthPark Mall, donated a \$10,000.00 amount to go towards the center of town also, the redevelopment there...adopt please. I have Resolution No. 2022-022 and this is to accept a donation from the Strongsville Community Theater in the amount of \$2,000.00. It would be appreciated for that to be adopt.

Mr. Carbone – Thank you, any questions for Ms. Roth? I did send the Mayor, Bryan Bogre and Brent Painter, along with Ms. Roff, an email last week about the downtown center plan. I think we all are very excited about it, very excited that we're at the point we're at with the plan. I just wanted to make sure one thing I've been relaying is having a full plan of all three ball diamonds. We know there's only going to be one the first phase; but we know there's many other phases to come. I still believe that it's very important that we have a complete plan with all the desired amenities; and then we phase it out. That was one thing that I reiterated in the email to everyone and we'll be waiting for a response on that.

Ms. Roff – Do you, at one point, have a...someone that gave you or offered to have that plan for the 1, 2, 3, 4?

Mr. Carbone – There was something many years ago, about 10 years ago, when we were doing the middle school and the renovation of the high school through the bond issue. There was something that we looked at; and that's where the idea came from, was from them as far as utilizing these underutilized fields as a potential site for this. They put the main...the splash pad, the playground, they put 4 main things with the other desirable stuff they would put in between; but one thing I reference and I handed out last year, was North Royalton...they have a full master planned area and they're it in phases; and it's just something that I'm really...we're excited about this. We just want to make sure we have a good road map so at build-out it's the appropriate locations and the desirable amenities and that we just keep on working towards that.

Ms. Roff – You know me, I'm a fan of a beginning, a middle and end.

Mr. Carbone – Anything else for Ms. Roff?
